How to appeal this permit

The issuance of this PTI is a final action of the Director and may be appealed to the Environmental Review Appeals Commission pursuant to Section 3745.04 of the Ohio Revised Code. The appeal must be in writing and set forth the action complained of and the grounds upon which the appeal is based. The appeal must be filed with the Commission within thirty (30) days after notice of the Director's action. The appeal must be accompanied by a filing fee of \$70.00, made payable to "Ohio Treasurer Josh Mandel," which the Commission, in its discretion, may reduce if by affidavit you demonstrate that payment of the full amount of the fee would cause extreme hardship. Notice of the filing of the appeal shall be filed with the Director within three (3) days of filing with the Commission. Ohio EPA requests that a copy of the appeal be served upon the Ohio Attorney General's Office, Environmental Enforcement Section. A. Standard Terms and Conditions

1. Federally Enforceable Standard Terms and Conditions

- a) All Standard Terms and Conditions are federally enforceable, with the exception of those listed below which are enforceable under State law only:
 - (1) Standard Term and Condition A.2.a), Severability Clause
 - (2) Standard Term and Condition A.3.c) through A. 3.e) General Requirements
 - (3) Standard Term and Condition A.6.c) and A. 6.d), Compliance Requirements
 - (4) Standard Term and Condition A.9., Reporting Requirements
 - (5) Standard Term and Condition A.10., Applicability
 - (6) Standard Term and Condition A.11.b) through A.11.e), Construction of New Source(s) and Authorization to Install
 - (7) Standard Term and Condition A.14., Public Disclosure
 - (8) Standard Term and Condition A.15., Additional Reporting Requirements When There Are No Deviations of Federally Enforceable Emission Limitations, Operational Restrictions, or Control Device Operating Parameter Limitations
 - (9) Standard Term and Condition A.16., Fees
 - (10) Standard Term and Condition A.17., Permit Transfers

2. Severability Clause

- a) A determination that any term or condition of this permit is invalid shall not invalidate the force or effect of any other term or condition thereof, except to the extent that any other term or condition depends in whole or in part for its operation or implementation upon the term or condition declared invalid.
- b) All terms and conditions designated in parts B and C of this permit are federally enforceable as a practical matter, if they are required under the Act, or any of its applicable requirements, including relevant provisions designed to limit the potential to emit of a source, are enforceable by the Administrator of the U.S. EPA and the State and by citizens (to the extent allowed by section 304 of the Act) under the Act. Terms and conditions in parts B and C of this permit shall not be federally enforceable and shall be enforceable under State law only, only if specifically identified in this permit as such.

3. General Requirements

- a) Any noncompliance with the federally enforceable terms and conditions of this permit constitutes a violation of the Act, and is grounds for enforcement action or for permit revocation, revocation and re-issuance, or modification.

- b) It shall not be a defense for the permittee in an enforcement action that it would have been necessary to halt or reduce the permitted activity in order to maintain compliance with the federally enforceable terms and conditions of this permit.
- c) This permit may be modified, revoked, or revoked and reissued, for cause. The filing of a request by the permittee for a permit modification, revocation and reissuance, or revocation, or of a notification of planned changes or anticipated noncompliance does not stay any term and condition of this permit.
- d) This permit does not convey any property rights of any sort, or any exclusive privilege.
- e) The permittee shall furnish to the Director of the Ohio EPA, or an authorized representative of the Director, upon receipt of a written request and within a reasonable time, any information that may be requested to determine whether cause exists for modifying or revoking this permit or to determine compliance with this permit. Upon request, the permittee shall also furnish to the Director or an authorized representative of the Director, copies of records required to be kept by this permit. For information claimed to be confidential in the submittal to the Director, if the Administrator of the U.S. EPA requests such information, the permittee may furnish such records directly to the Administrator along with a claim of confidentiality.

4. Monitoring and Related Record Keeping and Reporting Requirements

- a) Except as may otherwise be provided in the terms and conditions for a specific emissions unit, the permittee shall maintain records that include the following, where applicable, for any required monitoring under this permit:
 - (1) The date, place (as defined in the permit), and time of sampling or measurements.
 - (2) The date(s) analyses were performed.
 - (3) The company or entity that performed the analyses.
 - (4) The analytical techniques or methods used.
 - (5) The results of such analyses.
 - (6) The operating conditions existing at the time of sampling or measurement.
- b) Each record of any monitoring data, testing data, and support information required pursuant to this permit shall be retained for a period of five years from the date the record was created. Support information shall include, but not be limited to all calibration and maintenance records and all original strip-chart recordings for continuous monitoring instrumentation, and copies of all reports required by this permit. Such records may be maintained in computerized form.
- c) Except as may otherwise be provided in the terms and conditions for a specific emissions unit, the permittee shall submit required reports in the following manner:
 - (1) Reports of any required monitoring and/or recordkeeping of federally enforceable information shall be submitted to the Ohio EPA DAPC, Northwest District Office.

- (2) Quarterly written reports of (i) any deviations from federally enforceable emission limitations, operational restrictions, and control device operating parameter limitations, excluding deviations resulting from malfunctions reported in accordance with OAC rule 3745-15-06, that have been detected by the testing, monitoring and recordkeeping requirements specified in this permit, (ii) the probable cause of such deviations, and (iii) any corrective actions or preventive measures taken, shall be made to the Ohio EPA DAPC, Northwest District Office. The written reports shall be submitted (i.e., postmarked) quarterly, by January 31, April 30, July 31, and October 31 of each year and shall cover the previous calendar quarters. See A.15. below if no deviations occurred during the quarter.
 - (3) Written reports, which identify any deviations from the federally enforceable monitoring, recordkeeping, and reporting requirements contained in this permit shall be submitted to the Ohio EPA DAPC, Northwest District Office every six months, by January 31 and July 31 of each year for the previous six calendar months. If no deviations occurred during a six-month period, the permittee shall submit a semi-annual report, which states that no deviations occurred during that period.
 - (4) This permit is for an emissions unit located at a Title V facility. Each written report shall be signed by a responsible official certifying that, based on information and belief formed after reasonable inquiry, the statements and information in the report are true, accurate, and complete.
- d) The permittee shall report actual emissions pursuant to OAC Chapter 3745-78 for the purpose of collecting Air Pollution Control Fees.

5. Scheduled Maintenance/Malfunction Reporting

Any scheduled maintenance of air pollution control equipment shall be performed in accordance with paragraph (A) of OAC rule 3745-15-06. The malfunction, i.e., upset, of any emissions units or any associated air pollution control system(s) shall be reported to the Ohio EPA DAPC, Northwest District Office in accordance with paragraph (B) of OAC rule 3745-15-06. (The definition of an upset condition shall be the same as that used in OAC rule 3745-15-06(B)(1) for a malfunction.) The verbal and written reports shall be submitted pursuant to OAC rule 3745-15-06.

Except as provided in that rule, any scheduled maintenance or malfunction necessitating the shutdown or bypassing of any air pollution control system(s) shall be accompanied by the shutdown of the emission unit(s) that is (are) served by such control system(s).

6. Compliance Requirements

- a) All applications, notifications or reports required by terms and conditions in this permit to be submitted or "reported in writing" are to be submitted to Ohio EPA through the Ohio EPA's eBusiness Center: Air Services web service ("Air Services"). Ohio EPA will accept hard copy submittals on an as-needed basis if the permittee cannot submit the required documents through the Ohio EPA eBusiness Center. In the event of an alternative hard copy submission in lieu of the eBusiness Center, the post-marked date or the date the document is delivered in person will be recognized as the date submitted. Electronic submission of applications, notifications or reports required to be submitted to Ohio EPA fulfills the requirement to submit the required information to the Director, the appropriate Ohio EPA District Office or contracted

local air agency, and/or any other individual or organization specifically identified as an additional recipient identified in this permit unless otherwise specified. Consistent with OAC rule 3745-15-03, the electronic signature date shall constitute the date that the required application, notification or report is considered to be "submitted". Any document requiring signature may be represented by entry of the personal identification number (PIN) by responsible official as part of the electronic submission process or by the scanned attestation document signed by the Authorized Representative that is attached to the electronically submitted written report.

Any document (including reports) required to be submitted and required by a federally applicable requirement in this permit shall include a certification by a Responsible Official that, based on information and belief formed after reasonable inquiry, the statements in the document are true, accurate, and complete.

- b) Upon presentation of credentials and other documents as may be required by law, the permittee shall allow the Director of the Ohio EPA or an authorized representative of the Director to:
- (1) At reasonable times, enter upon the permittee's premises where a source is located or the emissions-related activity is conducted, or where records must be kept under the conditions of this permit.
 - (2) Have access to and copy, at reasonable times, any records that must be kept under the conditions of this permit, subject to the protection from disclosure to the public of confidential information consistent with ORC section 3704.08.
 - (3) Inspect at reasonable times any facilities, equipment (including monitoring and air pollution control equipment), practices, or operations regulated or required under this permit.
 - (4) As authorized by the Act, sample or monitor at reasonable times substances or parameters for the purpose of assuring compliance with the permit and applicable requirements.
- c) The permittee shall submit progress reports to the Ohio EPA DAPC, Northwest District Office concerning any schedule of compliance for meeting an applicable requirement. Progress reports shall be submitted semiannually or more frequently if specified in the applicable requirement or by the Director of the Ohio EPA. Progress reports shall contain the following:
- (1) Dates for achieving the activities, milestones, or compliance required in any schedule of compliance, and dates when such activities, milestones, or compliance were achieved.
 - (2) An explanation of why any dates in any schedule of compliance were not or will not be met, and any preventive or corrective measures adopted.

7. Best Available Technology

As specified in OAC Rule 3745-31-05, new sources that must employ Best Available Technology (BAT) shall comply with the Applicable Emission Limitations/Control Measures identified as BAT for each subject emissions unit.

8. Air Pollution Nuisance

The air contaminants emitted by the emissions units covered by this permit shall not cause a public nuisance, in violation of OAC rule 3745-15-07.

9. Reporting Requirements

The permittee shall submit required reports in the following manner:

- a) Reports of any required monitoring and/or recordkeeping of state-only enforceable information shall be submitted to the Ohio EPA DAPC, Northwest District Office.
- b) Except as otherwise may be provided in the terms and conditions for a specific emissions unit, quarterly written reports of (a) any deviations (excursions) from state-only required emission limitations, operational restrictions, and control device operating parameter limitations that have been detected by the testing, monitoring, and recordkeeping requirements specified in this permit, (b) the probable cause of such deviations, and (c) any corrective actions or preventive measures which have been or will be taken, shall be submitted to the Ohio EPA DAPC, Northwest District Office. If no deviations occurred during a calendar quarter, the permittee shall submit a quarterly report, which states that no deviations occurred during that quarter. The reports shall be submitted quarterly, by January 31, April 30, July 31, and October 31 of each year and shall cover the previous calendar quarters. (These quarterly reports shall exclude deviations resulting from malfunctions reported in accordance with OAC rule 3745-15-06.)

10. Applicability

This Permit-to-Install is applicable only to the emissions unit(s) identified in the Permit-to-Install. Separate application must be made to the Director for the installation or modification of any other emissions unit(s) not exempt from the requirement to obtain a Permit-to-Install.

11. Construction of New Sources(s) and Authorization to Install

- a) This permit does not constitute an assurance that the proposed source will operate in compliance with all Ohio laws and regulations. This permit does not constitute expressed or implied assurance that the proposed facility has been constructed in accordance with the application and terms and conditions of this permit. The action of beginning and/or completing construction prior to obtaining the Director's approval constitutes a violation of OAC rule 3745-31-02. Furthermore, issuance of this permit does not constitute an assurance that the proposed source will operate in compliance with all Ohio laws and regulations. Issuance of this permit is not to be construed as a waiver of any rights that the Ohio Environmental Protection Agency (or other persons) may have against the applicant for starting construction prior to the effective date of the permit. Additional facilities shall be installed upon orders of the Ohio Environmental Protection Agency if the proposed facilities cannot meet the requirements of this permit or cannot meet applicable standards.
- b) If applicable, authorization to install any new emissions unit included in this permit shall terminate within eighteen months of the effective date of the permit if the owner or operator has not undertaken a continuing program of installation or has not entered into a binding contractual obligation to undertake and complete within a reasonable time a continuing program of installation. This deadline may be extended by up to 12 months if application is made to the

Director within a reasonable time before the termination date and the permittee shows good cause for any such extension.

- c) The permittee may notify Ohio EPA of any emissions unit that is permanently shut down (i.e., the emissions unit has been physically removed from service or has been altered in such a way that it can no longer operate without a subsequent "modification" or "installation" as defined in OAC Chapter 3745-31) by submitting a certification from the authorized official that identifies the date on which the emissions unit was permanently shut down. Authorization to operate the affected emissions unit shall cease upon the date certified by the authorized official that the emissions unit was permanently shut down. At a minimum, notification of permanent shut down shall be made or confirmed by marking the affected emissions unit(s) as "permanently shut down" in "Air Services" along with the date the emissions unit(s) was permanently removed and/or disabled. Submitting the facility profile update electronically will constitute notifying the Director of the permanent shutdown of the affected emissions unit(s).
- d) The provisions of this permit shall cease to be enforceable for each affected emissions unit after the date on which an emissions unit is permanently shut down (i.e., emissions unit has been physically removed from service or has been altered in such a way that it can no longer operate without a subsequent "modification" or "installation" as defined in OAC Chapter 3745-31). All records relating to any permanently shutdown emissions unit, generated while the emissions unit was in operation, must be maintained in accordance with law. All reports required by this permit must be submitted for any period an affected emissions unit operated prior to permanent shut down. At a minimum, the permit requirements must be evaluated as part of the reporting requirements identified in this permit covering the last period the emissions unit operated.

Unless otherwise exempted, no emissions unit certified by the responsible official as being permanently shut down may resume operation without first applying for and obtaining a permit pursuant to OAC Chapter 3745-31 and OAC Chapter 3745-77 if the restarted operation is subject to one or more applicable requirements.

- e) The permittee shall comply with any residual requirements related to this permit, such as the requirement to submit a deviation report, air fee emission report, or other any reporting required by this permit for the period the operating provisions of this permit were enforceable, or as required by regulation or law. All reports shall be submitted in a form and manner prescribed by the Director. All records relating to this permit must be maintained in accordance with law.

12. Permit-To-Operate Application

The permittee is required to apply for a Title V permit pursuant to OAC Chapter 3745-77. The permittee shall submit a complete Title V permit application or a complete Title V permit modification application within twelve (12) months after commencing operation of the emissions units covered by this permit. However, if operation of the proposed new or modified source(s) as authorized by this permit would be prohibited by the terms and conditions of an existing Title V permit, a Title V permit modification of such new or modified source(s) pursuant to OAC rule 3745-77-04(D) and OAC rule 3745-77-08(C)(3)(d) must be obtained before operating the source in a manner that would violate the existing Title V permit requirements.

13. Construction Compliance Certification

The applicant shall identify the following dates in the "Air Services" facility profile for each new emissions unit identified in this permit.

- a) Completion of initial installation date shall be entered upon completion of construction and prior to start-up.
- b) Commence operation after installation or latest modification date shall be entered within 90 days after commencing operation of the applicable emissions unit.

14. Public Disclosure

The facility is hereby notified that this permit, and all agency records concerning the operation of this permitted source, are subject to public disclosure in accordance with OAC rule 3745-49-03.

15. Additional Reporting Requirements When There Are No Deviations of Federally Enforceable Emission Limitations, Operational Restrictions, or Control Device Operating Parameter Limitations

If no deviations occurred during a calendar quarter, the permittee shall submit a quarterly report, which states that no deviations occurred during that quarter. The reports shall be submitted quarterly by January 31, April 30, July 31, and October 31 of each year and shall cover the previous calendar quarters.

16. Fees

The permittee shall pay fees to the Director of the Ohio EPA in accordance with ORC section 3745.11 and OAC Chapter 3745-78. The permittee shall pay all applicable permit-to-install fees within 30 days after the issuance of any permit-to-install. The permittee shall pay all applicable permit-to-operate fees within thirty days of the issuance of the invoice.

17. Permit Transfers

Any transferee of this permit shall assume the responsibilities of the prior permit holder. The new owner must update and submit the ownership information via the "Owner/Contact Change" functionality in "Air Services" once the transfer is legally completed. The change must be submitted through "Air Services" within thirty days of the ownership transfer date.

18. Risk Management Plans

If the permittee is required to develop and register a risk management plan pursuant to section 112(r) of the Clean Air Act, as amended, 42 U.S.C. 7401 et seq. ("Act"), the permittee shall comply with the requirement to register such a plan.

19. Title IV Provisions

If the permittee is subject to the requirements of 40 CFR Part 72 concerning acid rain, the permittee shall ensure that any affected emissions unit complies with those requirements. Emissions exceeding any allowances that are lawfully held under Title IV of the Act, or any regulations adopted thereunder, are prohibited.

(2) Additional Terms and Conditions

- a. This permit establishes the following legally and practically enforceable emission limitations. The legally and practically enforceable emission limitations are voluntary restrictions established under OAC rule 3745-31-05(F) and are based



on the operational restrictions contained in c)(1) which requires the use of a baghouse:

- i. 2.27 lbs PM₁₀/hr; 9.96 tons PM₁₀/year;
 - ii. 1.52 lbs PM_{2.5}/hr; 6.67 tons PM_{2.5}/year;
 - iii. Visible PE shall not exceed 5% opacity, as a six-minute average;
 - iv. No visible emission of fugitive dust from the dryer
 - v. 0.26 ton fugitive PM₁₀/yr
 - vi. 0.08 ton fugitive PM_{2.5}/yr; and
 - vii. Visible emissions of fugitive dust shall not exceed 20% opacity, as a 3-minute average.
- b. Emissions of SO₂ from natural gas combustion are insignificant, and therefore, are not included in this permit.
- c. The permittee has committed to employ the following control measures for this emissions unit for purposes of ensuring compliance with the above-mentioned applicable requirements:

Material Processing and Handling Operation:	Control Measure(s)*
hopper/truck loading	maintain a moisture content sufficient to minimize or eliminate visible emissions of fugitive dust
conveyor transfer points	maintain a moisture content sufficient to minimize or eliminate visible emissions of fugitive dust

*If at any time the moisture content is not sufficient to meet the above applicable requirements, the permittee shall apply water to the area before conducting operations. Nothing in this paragraph shall prohibit the permittee from employing other control measures to ensure compliance.

- d. For each material processing and handling operation, the above-identified control measure(s) shall be implemented in the permittee determines, as a result of the inspection conducted pursuant to the monitoring section of this permit, that the control measure(s) is (are) necessary to ensure compliance with the above-mentioned applicable requirements. Any required implementation of the control measure(s) shall continue during the material processing and handling operation(s) until further observation confirms that use of the control measure(s) is unnecessary.

- e. The Best Available Technology (BAT) emission limit applies until U.S. EPA approves Ohio Administrative Code (OAC) paragraph 3745-31-05(A)(3)(a)(ii) (less than 10 tons per year BAT exemption) into the Ohio State Implementation Plan (SIP).
 - f. These requirements apply once U.S. EPA approves OAC paragraph 3745-31-05(A)(3)(a)(ii) (the less than 10 tons per year BAT exemption) as part of the Ohio SIP.
 - g. The requirements of this rule are less stringent than the requirements established pursuant to OAC rule 3745-31-05(F).
 - h. This emissions unit is exempt from the visible emissions limitations for fugitive dust, specified in OAC rule 3745-17-07(B), pursuant to OAC rule 3745-17-07(B)(11)(e), because the emissions unit is not located within areas identified in "Appendix A" of OAC rule 3745-17-08.
 - i. This facility is not located within an "Appendix A" area as identified in OAC rule 3745-17-08. Therefore, pursuant to OAC rule 3745-17-08(A), this emissions unit is exempt from the requirements of OAC rule 3745-17-08(B).
- c) Operational Restrictions
- (1) The following operational restrictions have been included in this permit for the purpose of establishing the following legally and practically enforceable requirements: [See b)(2)a.]
 - a. Use of a baghouse with a maximum outlet concentration of 0.01 gr/dscf for PM₁₀.
 - b. Use of a baghouse with a maximum outlet concentration of 0.0065 gr/dscf for PM_{2.5}.
 - (2) The permittee shall burn only natural gas in this emissions unit.
- d) Monitoring and/or Recordkeeping Requirements
- (1) The permittee shall perform daily checks, when the emissions unit is in operation and when the weather conditions allow, for any visible particulate emissions from the stack serving this emissions unit. The presence or absence of any visible emissions shall be noted in an operations log. If visible emissions are observed, the permittee shall also note the following in the operations log:
 - a. the color of the emissions;
 - b. whether the emissions are representative of normal operations;
 - c. if the emissions are not representative of normal operations, the cause of the abnormal emissions;
 - d. the total duration of any visible emissions incident; and
 - e. any corrective actions taken to eliminate the visible emissions.

- b. each instance when a control measure, that was to be implemented as a result of an inspection, was not implemented.

These reports shall be submitted to the Director (the appropriate Ohio EPA District Office or local air agency) by January 31 and July 31 of each year and shall cover the previous 6-month period.

- (3) The permittee shall submit deviation (excursion) reports that identify each day when a fuel other than natural gas was burned in this emissions unit. Each report shall be submitted within 30 days after the deviation occurs.

f) Testing Requirements

- (1) The permittee shall conduct, or have conducted, emission testing for this emissions unit in accordance with the following requirements:
 - a. The emission testing shall be conducted within 60 days after achieving the maximum production rate that the emissions unit will be operated, but no later than 180 days after the initial startup of each emission unit. **(A compliant emission test was performed on January 28, 2016)**
 - b. The emission testing shall be conducted to demonstrate compliance with the following emission rates:
 - i. 2.27 lbs PM₁₀/hr from the aglime dryer stack
 - ii. 1.52 lbs PM_{2.5}/hr from the aglime dryer stack
 - c. The following test method(s) shall be employed to demonstrate compliance with the allowable mass emission rate(s):

PM₁₀/PM_{2.5} – 40 CFR Part 60, Appendix A, Methods 1-4 and 40 CFR Part 51, Appendix M, Methods 201/201A and 202

Alternative U.S. EPA approved test methods may be used with prior approval from the Ohio EPA.
 - d. The test(s) shall be conducted at a Maximum Source Operating Rate (MSOR), unless otherwise specified or approved by the appropriate Ohio EPA District Office or local air agency. MSOR is defined as the condition that is most likely to challenge the emission control measures with regards to meeting the applicable emission standard(s). Although it generally consists of operating the emissions unit at its maximum material input/production rates and results in the highest emission rate of the tested pollutant, there may be circumstances where a lower emissions loading is deemed the most challenging control scenario. Failure to test at the MSOR is justification for not accepting the test results as a demonstration of compliance.
 - e. Not later than 30 days prior to the proposed test date(s), the permittee shall submit an "Intent to Test" notification to the appropriate Ohio EPA District Office



or local air agency. The "Intent to Test" notification shall describe in detail the proposed test methods and procedures, the emissions unit operating parameters, the time(s) and date(s) of the test(s), and the person(s) who will be conducting the test(s). Failure to submit such notification for review and approval prior to the test(s) may result in the appropriate Ohio EPA District Office or local air agency's refusal to accept the results of the emission test(s).

- f. Personnel from the appropriate Ohio EPA District Office or local air agency shall be permitted to witness the test(s), examine the testing equipment, and acquire data and information necessary to ensure that the operation of the emissions unit and the testing procedures provide a valid characterization of the emissions from the emissions unit and/or the performance of the control equipment.
 - g. A comprehensive written report on the results of the emissions test(s) shall be signed by the person or persons responsible for the tests and submitted to the appropriate Ohio EPA District Office or local air agency within 30 days following completion of the test(s). The permittee may request additional time for the submittal of the written report, where warranted, with prior approval from the appropriate Ohio EPA District Office or local air agency.
- (2) Compliance with the Emissions Limitations and/or Control Requirements specified in section b) of these terms and conditions shall be determined in accordance with the following methods:

a. Emission Limitation:

2.27 lbs PM₁₀/hr, 9.96 tons PM₁₀/yr from aglime drying stack

Applicable Compliance Method:

The permittee shall determine compliance with the 2.27 lbs PM₁₀/hr emissions limitation in accordance with the emission testing requirements in f)(1).

The annual limitation was developed by adding the emissions from the aglime drying and natural gas combustion. The annual emissions from aglime drying were determined by multiplying the baghouse maximum outlet concentration of 0.01 gr PM₁₀/dscf by a maximum volumetric flow rate provided by the company, the maximum operating schedule of 8760 hours/year and applying the conversion factors of 60 minutes/hour, 2000 lbs/ton and 7000 grains/pound. The emissions from natural gas combustion were developed by multiplying the maximum heat input from the dryer by the emission factor 1.9 lbs PM₁₀/mm scf, dividing by 1020 mm Btu/mm scf from AP-42 Table 1.4-1 (revised 7/98), multiplying by the maximum operating schedule of 8760 hrs/year and dividing by 2000 lbs/ton.

Therefore, provided compliance is shown with the hourly emission limitation, compliance with the annual limitation shall also be demonstrated.

b. Emission Limitation:

1.52 lbs PM_{2.5}/hr, 6.67 tons PM_{2.5}/yr from aglime drying stack

Applicable Compliance Method:

The permittee shall determine compliance with the 1.52 lbs PM_{2.5}/hr emissions limitation in accordance with the emission testing requirements in f)(1).

The annual limitation was developed by adding the emissions from the aglime drying and natural gas combustion. The annual emissions from aglime drying were determined by multiplying the baghouse maximum outlet concentration of 0.0065 gr PM_{2.5}/dscf by a maximum volumetric flow rate provided by the company, the maximum operating schedule of 8760 hours/year and applying the conversion factors of 60 minutes/hour, 2000 lbs/ton and 7000 grains/pound. The emissions from natural gas combustion were developed by multiplying the maximum heat input from the dryer by the emission factor 1.9 lbs PM_{2.5}/mm scf, dividing by 1020 mm Btu/mm scf from AP-42 Table 1.4-1 (revised 7/98), multiplying by the maximum operating schedule of 8760 hrs/year and dividing by 2000 lbs/ton.

Therefore, provided compliance is shown with the hourly emission limitation, compliance with the annual limitation shall also be demonstrated.

Emission Limitation:

Visible particulate emissions from the stack serving this emissions unit shall not exceed 5% opacity as a six-minute average.

Applicable Compliance Method:

If required, compliance with the stack visible particulate emissions limitation shall be determined through visible emissions observations performed in accordance with Method 9 of 40 CFR Part 60, Appendix A.

c. Emission Limitation:

No visible emissions of fugitive dust from the dryer

Applicable Compliance Method:

If required, compliance with the visible emissions limitation for fugitive dust from material handling operations shall be determined through visible emissions observations performed in accordance with Method 9 of 40 CFR Part 60, Appendix A.

d. Emission Limitation:

0.26 ton fugitive PM₁₀/yr

Applicable Compliance Method:

The annual fugitive PM₁₀ limitation was developed by applying the appropriate emission factor from AP-42 13.2.4 (revised 11/06) of 0.00081 lb PM₁₀/ton for feed hopper loading and AP-42 Table 11.19.2-2 (revised 8/04) of 0.00010 lb PM₁₀/ton for truck loading and 0.00005 lb PM₁₀/ton for all conveyor transfer points to a maximum hourly throughput rate, multiplying by a maximum operating schedule of 8760 hours/year and dividing by 2000 lbs/ton.

*Controlled emission factors were used for aggregate transfer due to high moisture content of material.

e. Emission Limitation:

0.08 ton fugitive PM_{2.5}/yr

Applicable Compliance Method:

The annual fugitive PM_{2.5} limitation was developed by applying the appropriate emission factor from AP-42 13.2.4 (revised 11/06) of 0.00012 lb PM_{2.5}/ton for feed hopper loading and AP-42 Table 11.19.2-2 (revised 8/04) of 0.00010 lb PM_{2.5}/ton for truck loading and 0.00001 lb PM_{2.5}/ton for all conveyor transfer points to a maximum hourly throughput rate, multiplying by a maximum operating schedule of 8760 hours/year and dividing by 2000 lbs/ton.

*Controlled emission factors were used for aggregate transfer due to high moisture content of material.

**If no PM_{2.5} emission factor was available (truck loading) it was assumed all PM₁₀ = PM_{2.5}.

f. Emission Limitation:

Visible emissions of fugitive dust from material handling operations shall not exceed 20 percent opacity as a three-minute average.

Applicable Compliance Method:

If required, compliance with the visible emissions limitation for fugitive dust from material handling operations shall be determined through visible emissions observations performed in accordance with Method 9 of 40 CFR Part 60, Appendix A.

g. Emission Limitation:

NOx emissions shall not exceed 2.56 tons/month averaged over a twelve-month, rolling period.

Applicable Compliance Method:

The emission limitation was developed by multiplying the maximum heat input from the dryer by the emission factor 100 lbs NO_x/mm scf, dividing by 1020 mm Btu/mm scf from AP-42 Table 1.4-1 (revised 7/98), multiplying by the maximum operating schedule of 8760 hrs/year, dividing by 2000 lbs/ton and then dividing by 1 year/12 months.

h. Emission Limitation:

CO emissions shall not exceed 2.15 tons/month averaged over a twelve-month, rolling period.

Applicable Compliance Method:

The emission limitation was developed by multiplying the maximum heat input from the dryer by the emission factor 84 lbs CO/mm scf, dividing by 1020 mm Btu/mm scf from AP-42 Table 1.4-1 (revised 7/98), multiplying by the maximum operating schedule of 8760 hrs/year, dividing by 2000 lbs/ton and then dividing by 1 year/12 months.

i. Emission Limitation:

PM₁₀ emissions shall not exceed 0.85 ton/month averaged over a twelve-month, rolling period.

Applicable Compliance Method:

The above emission limitation represents the potential to emit of the emissions unit, therefore, no monitoring, record keeping or compliance method calculations are required to demonstrate compliance with this limitation.

The potential to emit was calculated by adding the annual PM₁₀ emissions from aglime drying, natural gas combustion and material handling and then dividing by 1 year/12 months.

j. Emission Limitation:

VOC emissions shall not exceed 0.14 tons/month averaged over a twelve-month, rolling period.

Applicable Compliance Method:

The emission limitation was developed by multiplying the maximum heat input from the dryer by the emission factor 5.5 lbs VOC/mm scf, dividing by 1020 mm Btu/mm scf from AP-42 Table 1.4-1 (revised 7/98), multiplying by the maximum operating schedule of 8760 hrs/year, dividing by 2000 lbs/ton and then dividing by 1 year/12 months.



k. Emission Limitation:

PM_{2.5} emissions shall not exceed 0.56 ton/month averaged over a twelve-month, rolling period.

Applicable Compliance Method:

The above emission limitation represents the potential to emit of the emissions unit, therefore, no monitoring, record keeping or compliance method calculations are required to demonstrate compliance with this limitation.

The potential to emit was calculated by adding the annual PM_{2.5} emissions from aglime drying, natural gas combustion and material handling and then dividing by 1 year/12 months.
