How to appeal this permit

The issuance of this PTIO is a final action of the Director and may be appealed to the Environmental Review Appeals Commission pursuant to Section 3745.04 of the Ohio Revised Code. The appeal must be in writing and set forth the action complained of and the grounds upon which the appeal is based. The appeal must be filed with the Commission within thirty (30) days after notice of the Director's action. The appeal must be accompanied by a filing fee of \$70.00, made payable to "Ohio Treasurer Josh Mandel," which the Commission, in its discretion, may reduce if by affidavit you demonstrate that payment of the full amount of the fee would cause extreme hardship. Notice of the filing of the appeal shall be filed with the Director within three (3) days of filing with the Commission. Ohio EPA requests that a copy of the appeal be served upon the Ohio Attorney General's Office, Environmental Enforcement Section. A. Standard Terms and Conditions

1. What does this permit-to-install and operate ("PTIO") allow me to do?

This permit allows you to install and operate the emissions unit(s) identified in this PTIO. You must install and operate the unit(s) in accordance with the application you submitted and all the terms and conditions contained in this PTIO, including emission limits and those terms that ensure compliance with the emission limits (for example, operating, recordkeeping and monitoring requirements).

2. Who is responsible for complying with this permit?

The person identified on the "Authorization" page, above, is responsible for complying with this permit until the permit is revoked, terminated, or transferred. "Person" means a person, firm, corporation, association, or partnership. The words "you," "your," or "permittee" refer to the "person" identified on the "Authorization" page above.

The permit applies only to the emissions unit(s) identified in the permit. If you install or modify any other equipment that requires an air permit, you must apply for an additional PTIO(s) for these sources.

3. What records must I keep under this permit?

You must keep all records required by this permit, including monitoring data, test results, strip-chart recordings, calibration data, maintenance records, and any other record required by this permit for five years from the date the record was created. You can keep these records electronically, provided they can be made available to Ohio EPA during an inspection at the facility. Failure to make requested records available to Ohio EPA upon request is a violation of this permit requirement.

4. What are my permit fees and when do I pay them?

There are two fees associated with permitted air contaminant sources in Ohio:

PTIO fee. This one-time fee is based on a fee schedule in accordance with Ohio Revised Code (ORC) section 3745.11, or based on a time and materials charge for permit application review and permit processing if required by the Director.

You will be sent an invoice for this fee after you receive this PTIO and payment is due within 30 days of the invoice date. You are required to pay the fee for this PTIO even if you do not install or modify your operations as authorized by this permit.

Annual emissions fee. Ohio EPA will assess a separate fee based on the total annual emissions from your facility. You self-report your emissions in accordance with Ohio Administrative Code (OAC) Chapter 3745-78. This fee assessed is based on a fee schedule in ORC section 3745.11 and funds Ohio EPA's permit compliance oversight activities. For facilities that are permitted as synthetic minor sources, the fee schedule is adjusted annually for inflation. Ohio EPA will notify you when it is time to report your emissions and to pay your annual emission fees.

5. When does my PTIO expire, and when do I need to submit my renewal application?

This permit expires on the date identified at the beginning of this permit document (see "Authorization" page above) and you must submit a renewal application to renew the permit. Ohio EPA will send a renewal notice to you approximately six months prior to the expiration date of this permit. However, it is

very important that you submit a complete renewal permit application (postmarked prior to expiration of this permit) even if you do not receive the renewal notice.

If a complete renewal application is submitted before the expiration date, Ohio EPA considers this a timely application for purposes of ORC section 119.06, and you are authorized to continue operating the emissions unit(s) covered by this permit beyond the expiration date of this permit until final action is taken by Ohio EPA on the renewal application.

6. What happens to this permit if my project is delayed or I do not install or modify my source?

This PTIO expires 18 months after the issue date identified on the "Authorization" page above unless otherwise specified if you have not (1) started constructing the new or modified emission sources identified in this permit, or (2) entered into a binding contract to undertake such construction. This deadline can be extended by up to 12 months, provided you apply to Ohio EPA for this extension within a reasonable time before the 18-month period has ended and you can show good cause for any such extension.

7. What reports must I submit under this permit?

An annual permit evaluation report (PER) is required in addition to any malfunction reporting required by OAC rule 3745-15-06 or other specific rule-based reporting requirement identified in this permit. Your PER due date is identified in the Authorization section of this permit.

8. If I am required to obtain a Title V operating permit in the future, what happens to the operating provisions and PER obligations under this permit?

If you are required to obtain a Title V permit under OAC Chapter 3745-77 in the future, the permit-to-operate portion of this permit will be superseded by the issued Title V permit. From the effective date of the Title V permit forward, this PTIO will effectively become a PTI (permit-to-install) in accordance with OAC rule 3745-31-02(B). The following terms and conditions of this permit will no longer be applicable after issuance of the Title V permit: Section B, Term 1.b) and Section C, for each emissions unit, Term a)(2).

The PER requirements in this permit remain effective until the date the Title V permit is issued and is effective, and cease to apply after the effective date of the Title V permit. The final PER obligation will cover operations up to the effective date of the Title V permit and must be submitted on or before the submission deadline identified in this permit on the last day prior to the effective date of the Title V permit.

9. What are my obligations when I perform scheduled maintenance on air pollution control equipment?

You must perform scheduled maintenance of air pollution control equipment in accordance with OAC rule 3745-15-06(A). If scheduled maintenance requires shutting down or bypassing any air pollution control equipment, you must also shut down the emissions unit(s) served by the air pollution control equipment during maintenance, unless the conditions of OAC rule 3745-15-06(A)(3) are met. Any emissions that exceed permitted amount(s) under this permit (unless specifically exempted by rule) must be reported as deviations in the annual permit evaluation report (PER), including nonexempt excess emissions that occur during approved scheduled maintenance.

10. Do I have to report malfunctions of emissions units or air pollution control equipment? If so, how must I report?

If you have a reportable malfunction of any emissions unit(s) or any associated air pollution control system, you must report this to the [DO/LAA] in accordance with OAC rule 3745-15-06(B). Malfunctions that must be reported are those that result in emissions that exceed permitted emission levels. It is your responsibility to evaluate control equipment breakdowns and operational upsets to determine if a reportable malfunction has occurred.

If you have a malfunction, but determine that it is not a reportable malfunction under OAC rule 3745-15-06(B), it is recommended that you maintain records associated with control equipment breakdown or process upsets. Although it is not a requirement of this permit, Ohio EPA recommends that you maintain records for non-reportable malfunctions.

11. Can Ohio EPA or my local air agency inspect the facility where the emission unit(s) is/are located?

Yes. Under Ohio law, the Director or his authorized representative may inspect the facility, conduct tests, examine records or reports to determine compliance with air pollution laws and regulations and the terms and conditions of this permit. You must provide, within a reasonable time, any information Ohio EPA requests either verbally or in writing.

12. What happens if one or more emissions units operated under this permit is/are shut down permanently?

Ohio EPA can terminate the permit terms associated with any permanently shut down emissions unit. "Shut down" means the emissions unit has been physically removed from service or has been altered in such a way that it can no longer operate without a subsequent "modification" or "installation" as defined in OAC Chapter 3745-31.

You should notify Ohio EPA of any emissions unit that is permanently shut down by submitting a certification that identifies the date on which the emissions unit was permanently shut down. The certification must be submitted by an authorized official from the facility. You cannot continue to operate an emission unit once the certification has been submitted to Ohio EPA by the authorized official.

You must comply with all recordkeeping and reporting for any permanently shut down emissions unit in accordance with the provisions of the permit, regulations or laws that were enforceable during the period of operation, such as the requirement to submit a PER, air fee emission report, or malfunction report. You must also keep all records relating to any permanently shutdown emissions unit, generated while the emissions unit was in operation, for at least five years from the date the record was generated.

Again, you cannot resume operation of any emissions unit certified by the authorized official as being permanently shut down without first applying for and obtaining a permit pursuant to OAC Chapter 3745-31.

13. Can I transfer this permit to a new owner or operator?

You can transfer this permit to a new owner or operator. If you transfer the permit, you must follow the procedures in OAC Chapter 3745-31, including notifying Ohio EPA or the local air agency of the change in ownership or operator. Any transferee of this permit must assume the responsibilities of the transferor permit holder.

14. Does compliance with this permit constitute compliance with OAC rule 3745-15-07, "air pollution nuisance"?

This permit and OAC rule 3745-15-07 prohibit operation of the air contaminant source(s) regulated under this permit in a manner that causes a nuisance. Ohio EPA can require additional controls or modification of the requirements of this permit through enforcement orders or judicial enforcement action if, upon investigation, Ohio EPA determines existing operations are causing a nuisance.

15. What happens if a portion of this permit is determined to be invalid?

If a portion of this permit is determined to be invalid, the remainder of the terms and conditions remain valid and enforceable. The exception is where the enforceability of terms and conditions are dependent on the term or condition that was declared invalid.

Operations, Property and/or Equipment Description:

Miscellaneous Metal Parts Paint Spray Booth No. 1

- a) This permit document constitutes a permit-to-install issued in accordance with ORC 3704.03(F) and a permit-to-operate issued in accordance with ORC 3704.03(G).
 - (1) For the purpose of a permit-to-install document, the emissions unit terms and conditions identified below are federally enforceable with the exception of those listed below which are enforceable under state law only.
 - a. d)(11) through d)(13).
 - (2) For the purpose of a permit-to-operate document, the emissions unit terms and conditions identified below are enforceable under state law only with the exception of those listed below which are federally enforceable.
 - a. b)(1)b., b)(2)b., b)(2)d., c)(1), d)(2), d)(4), d)(5), e)(2), f)(1)c. and f)(1)d.
- b) Applicable Emissions Limitations and/or Control Requirements
 - (1) The specific operations(s), property, and/or equipment that constitute each emissions unit along with the applicable rules and/or requirements and with the applicable emissions limitations and/or control measures. Emissions from each unit shall not exceed the listed limitations, and the listed control measures shall be specified in narrative form following the table.

(2) Additional Terms and Conditions

- a. The requirements of this rule also include compliance with OAC rule 3745-21-09(U)(1)(c), OAC rule 3745-17-11(C) and OAC rule 3745-31-05(D).
- b. The emissions of VOC from emissions unit K001 shall not exceed 26.25 tons per year based on a rolling, 12-month summation of the monthly emissions. The federally enforceable VOC limitation is based on coating usage restrictions [See c)(1)] and VOC content requirements established by OAC rule 3745-21-09(U)(1)(c). Federally enforceable VOC limitations are being established for the purpose of avoiding Title V applicability [See c)(1)].
- c. The emission limitation for cleanup operations involve organic compounds which do not participate in atmospheric photochemical reactions [See c)(2)] and therefore, are not considered volatile organic compounds as defined in OAC rule 3745-21-01 and 40 CFR 51.100(s).
- d. HAP emissions from emissions unit K001 shall not exceed 9.09 tons per year for any individual HAP and 23.06 tons per year for any combination of HAPs, based upon a rolling 12-month summation of the monthly HAP emissions.

Federally Enforceable HAP limitations are being established for purposes of avoiding MACT and Title V applicability.

Compliance with the annual HAP emission limitations shall be based upon a rolling, 12-month summation of the monthly HAP emission rates.

c) Operational Restrictions

- (1) The maximum annual coating usage for emissions unit K001 shall not exceed 15,000 gallons. The annual coating usage limitations shall be based upon a rolling, 12-month summation of the monthly coating usage rate.

Compliance with the annual coating usage limitations shall be based upon a rolling, 12-month summation of the monthly coating usage rates.

- (2) The use of volatile organic compounds, as defined in OAC rule 3745-21-01, for cleanup operations in this emissions unit is prohibited.
- (3) The permittee shall operate the dry filtration system for the control of particulate emissions whenever this emissions unit is in operation and shall maintain the dry particulate filter in accordance with the manufacturer's recommendations, instructions, and/or operating manual(s), with any modifications deemed necessary by the permittee.
- (4) In the event the particulate filter system is not operating in accordance with the manufacturer's recommendations, instructions, or operating manual, with any

modifications deemed necessary by the permittee, the control device shall be expeditiously repaired or otherwise returned to these documented operating conditions.

d) **Monitoring and/or Recordkeeping Requirements**

- (1) The permittee shall collect and record the following information each month for coating usage in emissions unit K001:
 - a. the company name and identification for each coating employed;
 - b. the VOC content of each coating, as applied, in lbs/gallon;
 - c. the VOC content of each coating (excluding water and exempt solvents), in lbs/gallon, as applied [the VOC content shall be calculated in accordance with the equation specified in paragraph (B)(8) of OAC rule 3745-21-10 for $C_{VOC,2}$];
 - d. the number of gallons of each coating employed; and
 - e. the total VOC emission rate from all coatings employed, in lbs [summation of VOC emission rate [d)(1)b. x d)(1)d.] for each individual coating].
- (2) In conjunction with the recordkeeping requirements specified in d)(1) above, the permittee shall also record the following information each month for emissions unit K001:
 - a. the total annual emissions of VOC, in tons, based on a rolling, 12-month summation.
- (3) The permittee shall collect and record the following information each month for cleanup material usage in emissions unit K001:
 - a. the company name and identification for each cleanup material employed;
 - b. documentation of whether or not each cleanup material employed is a volatile organic compound as defined in OAC rule 3745-21-01 and 40 CFR 51.100(s);
 - c. the OC content of each cleanup material employed, in lbs/gallon;
 - d. the number of gallons of each cleanup material employed;
 - e. the OC emission rate for each cleanup material employed, [d)(3)c. x d)(3)d.], in lbs/month;

The company may calculate OC emissions from cleanup operations in accordance with the following formula if waste cleanup materials are sent off-site for reclamation/disposal

OC emissions from cleanup operations = (total gallons of cleanup material used x solvent density of cleanup material) - (total gallons cleanup material sent off-site for disposal or reclamation [minus solids content of said material] x solvent density

- f. the total OC emission rate, in tons, for all cleanup materials employed [sum of d)(3)e.]; and
 - g. the annual, year to date OC emissions, in tons, from all cleanup materials employed, [sum of d)(3)f.] for each calendar month to date from January to December).
- (4) The permittee shall collect and record the following information regarding HAP emissions each month for emissions unit K001:
- a. the company identification of each coating and cleanup material employed;
 - b. the lbs per gallon of each HAP in each coating and cleanup material, as applied;
 - c. the number of gallons of each coating and cleanup material employed;
 - d. the total emission rate for each HAP from all coatings and cleanup materials employed, [summation of each HAP emission rate [d)(4)b. x d)(4)c.] for each individual coating/cleanup material], in lbs/month;
 - e. the total HAP emission rate for the combination of all HAPs from all coatings and cleanup materials employed, [sum of d)(4)d. for all HAPs] in lbs/month;
 - f. the annual emissions of each HAP and the combination of all HAPs, based upon a rolling 12-month summation.
- (5) In addition to the above information, the permittee shall also collect and record the following information each month for emissions unit K001:
- a. the annual number of gallons of all coatings based upon a rolling, 12-month summation of the monthly coating usage rates.
- (6) The permittee shall maintain documentation of the manufacturer's recommendations, instructions, or operating manuals for the dry particulate filter, along with documentation of any modifications deemed necessary by the permittee. These documents shall be maintained at the facility and shall be made available to the appropriate Ohio EPA District Office or local air agency upon request.
- (7) The permittee shall conduct periodic inspections of the dry particulate filter to determine whether it is operating in accordance with the manufacturer's recommendations, instructions, or operating manuals with any modifications deemed necessary by the permittee or operator. These inspections shall be performed at a frequency that shall be based upon the recommendation of the manufacturer and the permittee shall maintain a copy of the manufacturer's recommended inspection frequency and it shall be made available to the Ohio EPA upon request.
- (8) In addition to the recommended periodic inspections, not less than once each calendar year the permittee shall conduct a comprehensive inspection of the dry particulate filter while the emissions unit is shut down and perform any needed maintenance and repair to ensure that it is operated in accordance with the manufacturer's recommendations.

- (9) The permittee shall document each inspection (periodic and annual) of the dry particulate filter system and shall maintain the following information:
- the date of the inspection;
 - a description of each/any problem identified and the date it was corrected;
 - a description of any maintenance and repairs performed; and
 - the name of person who performed the inspection.

These records shall be maintained at the facility for not less than five years from the date the inspection and any necessary maintenance or repairs were completed and shall be made available to the appropriate Ohio EPA District Office or local air agency upon request.

- (10) The permittee shall maintain records that document any time periods when the dry particulate filter was not in service when the emissions unit(s) was/were in operation, as well as, a record of all operations during which the dry particulate filter was not operated according to the manufacturer's recommendations with any documented modifications made by the permittee. These records shall be maintained for a period of not less than five years and shall be made available to the Ohio EPA upon request.

- (11) The permit to install for emission unit K001 was evaluated based on the actual materials (typically coatings and cleanup materials) and the design parameters of each emissions unit's exhaust system, as specified by the permittee in the permit to install application. The Ohio EPA's "Review of New Sources of Air Toxic Emissions" policy ("Air Toxic Policy") was applied for each pollutant emitted by these emission units using data from the permit to install application and the SCREEN 3.0 model (or other Ohio EPA approved model). The predicted 1-hour maximum ground-level concentration from the use of the SCREEN 3.0 model was compared to the Maximum Acceptable Ground-Level Concentration (MAGLC). The following summarizes the results of the modeling for the "worst case" pollutant(s):

(12) Physical changes to or changes in the method of operation of the emissions unit after its installation or modification could affect the parameters used to determine whether or not the "Air Toxic Policy" is satisfied. Consequently, prior to making a change that could impact such parameters, the permittee shall conduct an evaluation to determine that the "Air Toxic Policy" will still be satisfied. If, upon evaluation, the permittee determines that the "Air Toxic Policy" will not be satisfied, the permittee will not make the change. Changes that can affect the parameters used in applying the "Air Toxic Policy" include the following:

- a. changes in the composition of the materials used (typically for coatings or cleanup materials), or the use of new materials, that would result in the emission of a compound with a lower Threshold Limit Value (TLV), as indicated in the most recent version of the handbook entitled "American Conference of Governmental Industrial Hygienists (ACGIH)," than the lowest TLV value previously modeled;

- b. changes in the compositions of the materials, or use of new materials that would result in an increase in emissions of any pollutant with a listed TLV that was proposed in the application and modeled; and
- c. physical changes to the emissions unit or its exhaust parameters (e.g., increased/decreased exhaust flow, changes in stack height, changes in stack diameter, etc.).

If the permittee determines that the "Air Toxic Policy" will be satisfied for the above changes, the Ohio EPA will not consider the change(s) to be a "modification" under OAC rule 3745-31-01(VV)(1)(a)(ii), and a modification of the existing permit to install will not be required. If the change(s) is (are) defined as a modification under other provisions of the modification definition (other than (VV)(1)(a)(ii)), then the permittee shall obtain a final permit to install prior to the change.

- (13) The permittee shall collect, record, and retain the following information when it conducts evaluation to determine that the changed emissions unit will still satisfy the "Air Toxic Policy":
 - a. a description of the parameters changed (composition of materials, new pollutants emitted, change in stack/exhaust parameters, etc.)
 - b. documentation of its evaluation and determination that the changed emissions unit still satisfies the "Air Toxic Policy"; and
 - c. where computer modeling is performed, a copy of the resulting computer model runs that show the results of the application of the "Air Toxic Policy" for the change.

e) Reporting Requirements

- (1) All applications, notifications or reports required by terms and conditions in this permit to be submitted or "reported in writing" are to be submitted to Ohio EPA through the Ohio EPA's eBusiness Center: Air Services web service ("Air Services"). Ohio EPA will accept hard copy submittals on an as-needed basis if the permittee cannot submit the required documents through the Ohio EPA eBusiness Center. In the event of an alternative hard copy submission in lieu of the eBusiness Center, the post-marked date or the date the document is delivered in person will be recognized as the date submitted. Electronic submission of applications, notifications, or reports required to be submitted to Ohio EPA fulfills the requirement to submit the required information to the Director, the District Office or Local Air Agency, and/or any other individual or organization specifically identified as an additional recipient identified in this permit unless otherwise specified. Consistent with OAC rule 3745-15-03, the required application, notification or report is considered to be "submitted" on the date the submission is successful using a valid electronic signature. Signature by the signatory authority may be represented as provided through procedures established in Air Services.
- (2) The permittee shall submit quarterly deviation (excursion) reports that identify:

- a. all deviations (excursions) of the following emission limitations, operational restrictions and/or control device operating parameter limitations that restrict the potential to emit (PTE) of any regulated air pollutant and have been detected by the monitoring, record keeping and/or testing requirements in this permit:
 - i. any exceedances of the maximum allowable gallon usage rates specified in paragraph c)(1) of this permit;
 - ii. any exceedances of the maximum emission limitations for each HAP and total combined HAPs specified in paragraph b)(2)d. of this permit for emission unit K001; and
 - iii. any exceedances of the 26.25 tons VOC per rolling, 12-month period for emission unit K001.
- b. the probable cause of each deviation (excursion);
- c. any corrective actions that were taken to remedy the deviations (excursions) or prevent future deviations (excursions); and
- d. the magnitude and duration of each deviation (excursion).

If no deviations (excursions) occurred during a calendar quarter, the permittee shall submit a report that states that no deviations (excursions) occurred during the quarter.

The quarterly reports shall be submitted, electronically through Ohio EPA Air Services, each year by January 31 (covering October to December), April 30 (covering January to March), July 31 (covering April to June), and October 31 (covering July to September), unless an alternative schedule has been established and approved by the Director (the appropriate District Office or local air agency).

- (3) The permittee shall notify the Director (the appropriate Ohio EPA District Office or local air agency) in writing of any monthly record showing the use of a coating which does not comply with the 3.5 lbs VOC/gallon minus water and exempt solvents. The notification shall include a copy of such record and shall be sent to the Director (the appropriate Ohio EPA District Office or local air agency) within 30 days following the end of the calendar month.
- (4) The permittee shall notify the Director (the appropriate Ohio EPA District Office) in writing of any monthly record showing the use of a volatile organic compound as defined in OAC rule 3745-21-01 and/or 40 CFR 51.100(s) for cleanup operations. The notification shall include a copy of such record and shall be sent to the Director (the appropriate Ohio EPA District Office) within 30 days following the end of the calendar month.
- (5) The permittee shall submit an annual Permit Evaluation Report (PER) to the Ohio EPA. The PER must be submitted by the due date identified in the Authorization section of this permit. The permit evaluation report shall cover a reporting period of no more than twelve months for each air contaminant source identified in this permit.

f) Testing Requirements

(1) Compliance with the emission limitations in b)(1) of the terms and conditions of this permit shall be determined in accordance with the following methods:

a. Emission Limitation:26.25 lbs VOC/hr

Applicable Compliance Method: The hourly VOC limitation is based on the emission unit's potential to emit*. Therefore, no recordkeeping, deviation reporting, or compliance method calculations are required to demonstrate compliance.

*The potential to emit for this emissions unit was based on a maximum hourly coating usage of 7.5 gallons and a maximum VOC content of 3.5 pounds per gallon.

b. Emission Limitation:621.4 lbs OC/month and 3.73 tons OC/yr from cleanup materials

Applicable Compliance Method:Compliance with these limitations shall be demonstrated through the recordkeeping requirements in section d)(3) of this permit.

c. Emission Limitation: 26.25 tons VOC per rolling 12-month period

Applicable Compliance Method:Compliance with this limitation shall be demonstrated through the recordkeeping requirements in section d)(2) of this permit.

d. Emission Limitation: 9.09 tons per rolling 12-month period for any individual HAP and 23.06 tons per rolling 12-month period for any combination of HAPs

Applicable Compliance Method:Compliance with these limitations shall be demonstrated through the recordkeeping requirements in section d)(4) of this permit.

e. Emission Limitation: 3.5 pounds of VOC per gallon excluding water and exempt solvents for an extreme performance coating

Applicable Compliance Method:Compliance with this limitation shall be demonstrated through the recordkeeping requirements in section d)(1) of this permit. Formulation data or U.S. EPA Method 24 shall be used to determine the VOC content of the coating(s).

g) Miscellaneous Requirements

(1) None.
