Dear Permit Holder:

Enclosed please find a final Air Pollution Permit-to-Install and Operate ("PTIO") which will allow you to install, modify, and/or operate the described emissions unit(s) in the manner indicated in the permit. Because this permit contains conditions and restrictions, please read it very carefully.

Ohio EPA maintains a document entitled "Frequently Asked Questions about the PTIO". The document can be downloaded from the DAPC Web page, www.epa.state.oh.us/dapc, from the "Permits" link. This document contains additional information related to your permit, such as what activities are covered under the PTIO, who has enforcement authority over the permit and Ohio EPA's authorization to inspect your facility and records. Please contact the Office of Compliance Assistance and Pollution Prevention at (614) 644-3469 if you need assistance.

The issuance of this PTIO is a final action of the Director and may be appealed to the Environmental Review Appeals Commission ("ERAC") under Section 3745.04 of the Ohio Revised Code. The appeal must be in writing and describe the action complained of and the grounds for the appeal. The appeal must be filed with the ERAC within thirty (30) days after notice of the Director's action. A filing fee of \$70.00 must be submitted to the ERAC with the appeal, although the ERAC, has discretion to reduce the amount of the filing fee if you can demonstrate (by affidavit) that payment of the full amount of the fee would cause extreme hardship. If you file an appeal of this action, you must notify Ohio EPA of the filing of the appeal (by providing a copy to the Director) within three (3) days of filing your appeal with the ERAC. Ohio EPA requests that a copy of the appeal also be provided to the Ohio Attorney General's Office, Environmental Enforcement Section. An appeal may be filed with the ERAC at the following address:

A. Standard Terms and Conditions



1. What does this permit-to-install and operate ("PTIO") allow me to do?

This permit allows you to install and operate the emissions unit(s) identified in this PTIO. You must install and operate the unit(s) in accordance with the application you submitted and all the terms and conditions contained in this PTIO, including emission limits and those terms that ensure compliance with the emission limits (for example, operating, recordkeeping and monitoring requirements).

2. Who is responsible for complying with this permit?

The person identified on the "Authorization" page, above, is responsible for complying with this permit until the permit is revoked, terminated, or transferred. "Person" means a person, firm, corporation, association, or partnership. The words "you," "your," or "permittee" refer to the "person" identified on the "Authorization" page above.

The permit applies only to the emissions unit(s) identified in the permit. If you install or modify any other equipment that requires an air permit, you must apply for an additional PTIO(s) for these sources.

3. What records must I keep under this permit?

You must keep all records required by this permit, including monitoring data, test results, strip-chart recordings, calibration data, maintenance records, and any other record required by this permit for five years from the date the record was created. You can keep these records electronically, provided they can be made available to Ohio EPA during an inspection at the facility. Failure to make requested records available to Ohio EPA upon request is a violation of this permit requirement.

4. What are my permit fees and when do I pay them?

There are two fees associated with permitted air contaminant sources in Ohio:

- PTIO fee. This one-time fee is based on a fee schedule in accordance with Ohio Revised Code (ORC) section 3745.11, or based on a time and materials charge for permit application review and permit processing if required by the Director.

You will be sent an invoice for this fee after you receive this PTIO and payment is due within 30 days of the invoice date. You are required to pay the fee for this PTIO even if you do not install or modify your operations as authorized by this permit.

- Annual emissions fee. Ohio EPA will assess a separate fee based on the total annual emissions from your facility. You self-report your emissions in accordance with Ohio Administrative Code (OAC) Chapter 3745-78. This fee assessed is based on a fee schedule in ORC section 3745.11 and funds Ohio EPA's permit compliance oversight activities. For facilities that are permitted as synthetic minor sources, the fee schedule is adjusted annually for inflation. Ohio EPA will notify you when it is time to report your emissions and to pay your annual emission fees.

5. When does my PTIO expire, and when do I need to submit my renewal application?

This permit expires on the date identified at the beginning of this permit document (see "Authorization" page above) and you must submit a renewal application to renew the permit. Ohio EPA will send a renewal notice to you approximately six months prior to the expiration date of this permit. However, it is



very important that you submit a complete renewal permit application (postmarked prior to expiration of this permit) even if you do not receive the renewal notice.

If a complete renewal application is submitted before the expiration date, Ohio EPA considers this a timely application for purposes of ORC section 119.06, and you are authorized to continue operating the emissions unit(s) covered by this permit beyond the expiration date of this permit until final action is taken by Ohio EPA on the renewal application.

6. What happens to this permit if my project is delayed or I do not install or modify my source?

This PTIO expires 18 months after the issue date identified on the "Authorization" page above unless otherwise specified if you have not (1) started constructing the new or modified emission sources identified in this permit, or (2) entered into a binding contract to undertake such construction. This deadline can be extended by up to 12 months, provided you apply to Ohio EPA for this extension within a reasonable time before the 18-month period has ended and you can show good cause for any such extension.

7. What reports must I submit under this permit?

An annual permit evaluation report (PER) is required in addition to any malfunction reporting required by OAC rule 3745-15-06 or other specific rule-based reporting requirement identified in this permit. Your PER due date is identified in the Authorization section of this permit.

8. If I am required to obtain a Title V operating permit in the future, what happens to the operating provisions and PER obligations under this permit?

If you are required to obtain a Title V permit under OAC Chapter 3745-77 in the future, the permit-to-operate portion of this permit will be superseded by the issued Title V permit. From the effective date of the Title V permit forward, this PTIO will effectively become a PTI (permit-to-install) in accordance with OAC rule 3745-31-02(B). The following terms and conditions will no longer be applicable after issuance of the Title V permit: Section B, Term 1.b) and Section C, for each emissions unit, Term a)(2).

The PER requirements in this permit remain effective until the date the Title V permit is issued and is effective, and cease to apply after the effective date of the Title V permit. The final PER obligation will cover operations up to the effective date of the Title V permit and must be submitted on or before the submission deadline identified in this permit on the last day prior to the effective date of the Title V permit.

9. What are my obligations when I perform scheduled maintenance on air pollution control equipment?

You must perform scheduled maintenance of air pollution control equipment in accordance with OAC rule 3745-15-06(A). If scheduled maintenance requires shutting down or bypassing any air pollution control equipment, you must also shut down the emissions unit(s) served by the air pollution control equipment during maintenance, unless the conditions of OAC rule 3745-15-06(A)(3) are met. Any emissions that exceed permitted amount(s) under this permit (unless specifically exempted by rule) must be reported as deviations in the annual permit evaluation report (PER), including nonexempt excess emissions that occur during approved scheduled maintenance.



10. Do I have to report malfunctions of emissions units or air pollution control equipment? If so, how must I report?

If you have a reportable malfunction of any emissions unit(s) or any associated air pollution control system, you must report this to the Ohio EPA DAPC, Northwest District Office in accordance with OAC rule 3745-15-06(B). Malfunctions that must be reported are those that result in emissions that exceed permitted emission levels. It is your responsibility to evaluate control equipment breakdowns and operational upsets to determine if a reportable malfunction has occurred.

If you have a malfunction, but determine that it is not a reportable malfunction under OAC rule 3745-15-06(B), it is recommended that you maintain records associated with control equipment breakdown or process upsets. Although it is not a requirement of this permit, Ohio EPA recommends that you maintain records for non-reportable malfunctions.

11. Can Ohio EPA or my local air agency inspect the facility where the emission unit(s) is/are located?

Yes. Under Ohio law, the Director or his authorized representative may inspect the facility, conduct tests, examine records or reports to determine compliance with air pollution laws and regulations and the terms and conditions of this permit. You must provide, within a reasonable time, any information Ohio EPA requests either verbally or in writing.

12. What happens if one or more emissions units operated under this permit is/are shut down permanently?

Ohio EPA can terminate the permit terms associated with any permanently shut down emissions unit. "Shut down" means the emissions unit has been physically removed from service or has been altered in such a way that it can no longer operate without a subsequent "modification" or "installation" as defined in OAC Chapter 3745-31.

You should notify Ohio EPA of any emissions unit that is permanently shut down by submitting a certification that identifies the date on which the emissions unit was permanently shut down. The certification must be submitted by an authorized official from the facility. You cannot continue to operate an emission unit once the certification has been submitted to Ohio EPA by the authorized official.

You must comply with all recordkeeping and reporting for any permanently shut down emissions unit in accordance with the provisions of the permit, regulations or laws that were enforceable during the period of operation, such as the requirement to submit a PER, air fee emission report, or malfunction report. You must also keep all records relating to any permanently shutdown emissions unit, generated while the emissions unit was in operation, for at least five years from the date the record was generated.

Again, you cannot resume operation of any emissions unit certified by the authorized official as being permanently shut down without first applying for and obtaining a permit pursuant to OAC Chapter 3745-31.

13. Can I transfer this permit to a new owner or operator?

You can transfer this permit to a new owner or operator. If you transfer the permit, you must follow the procedures in OAC Chapter 3745-31, including notifying Ohio EPA or the local air agency of the

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change in ownership or operator. Any transferee of this permit must assume the responsibilities of the transferor permit holder.

14. Does compliance with this permit constitute compliance with OAC rule 3745-15-07, "air pollution nuisance"?

This permit and OAC rule 3745-15-07 prohibit operation of the air contaminant source(s) regulated under this permit in a manner that causes a nuisance. Ohio EPA can require additional controls or modification of the requirements of this permit through enforcement orders or judicial enforcement action if, upon investigation, Ohio EPA determines existing operations are causing a nuisance.

15. What happens if a portion of this permit is determined to be invalid?

If a portion of this permit is determined to be invalid, the remainder of the terms and conditions remain valid and enforceable. The exception is where the enforceability of terms and conditions are dependent on the term or condition that was declared invalid.

a) This permit document constitutes a permit-to-install issued in accordance with ORC 3704.03(F) and a permit-to-operate issued in accordance with ORC 3704.03(G).

(1) For the purpose of a permit-to-install document, the emissions unit terms and conditions identified below are federally enforceable with the exception of those listed below which are enforceable under state law only.

(2) For the purpose of a permit-to-operate document, the emissions unit terms and conditions identified below are enforceable under state law only with the exception of those listed below which are federally enforceable.

b) Applicable Emissions Limitations and/or Control Requirements

Emissions from each unit shall not exceed the listed limitations, and the listed control measures shall be specified in narrative form following the table.

(2) Additional Terms and Conditions

- a. The emission limitations specified by this rule is equivalent to the emission limitation established pursuant to OAC rule 3745-31-05(A)(3).
- b. The emission limitation specified by this rule is less stringent than the emission limitation established pursuant to OAC rule 3745-31-05(A)(3).

c) Operational Restrictions

- (1) The maximum annual operating hours for this emissions unit shall not exceed 452 hours based upon a rolling, 12-month summation.
- (2) The permittee shall burn only number two fuel oil in this emission unit. The number two oil shall contain less than 0.5% sulfur by weight.
- (3) These emission units have been in operation for over 12 months and, for the purposes of demonstrating compliance with the first 12 months of the rolling restriction, the permittee shall use existing records verified by the Ohio EPA, Northwest District Office.

d) Monitoring and/or Recordkeeping Requirements

- (1) The permittee shall maintain monthly records of the following information for emission unit P001:
 - a. the total hours of operation per month;
 - b. the rolling, 12-month summation of the total hours of operation;
 - c. the calculated emissions of NOx, in tons; and
 - d. the rolling, 12-month summation of NOx, in tons.
- (2) For each day during which the permittee burns a fuel other than number two fuel oil, the permittee shall maintain a record of the type and quantity of fuel burned in this emissions unit.
- (3) For each shipment of oil received for burning in this emissions unit, the permittee shall maintain records of the total quantity of oil received and the permittee's or oil supplier's analysis for sulfur content and heat content.
- (4) The permittee shall collect or require the oil supplier to collect a representative grab sample for each shipment of oil that is received for burning in this emissions unit. The permittee shall perform or require the supplier to perform the analysis for sulfur content and heat content in accordance with the following ASTM methods: ASTM method



D4294, ASTM method D240, or ASTM method 6010 for sulfur content; and ASTM method D240 for heat content. Alternative, equivalent methods may be used upon written approval by the appropriate Ohio EPA District Office or local air agency.

e) Reporting Requirements

- (1) Annual Permit Evaluation Report (PER) forms will be mailed to the permittee at the end of the reporting period specified in the Authorization section of this permit. The permittee shall submit the PER in the form and manner provided by the director by the due date identified in the Authorization section of this permit. The permit evaluation report shall cover a reporting period of no more than twelve-months for each air contaminant source identified in this permit.
- (2) The permittee shall submit quarterly deviation (excursion) reports which identify all exceedances of the 452 hours of operation per rolling 12-month period for emission unit P001. These reports are due by the date described in the Standard Terms and Conditions of this permit.

f) Testing Requirements

- (1) The permittee shall conduct, or have conducted, emission testing for one of the following emission units contained in this PTIO: P002-P005. The result of this test will be used to demonstrate compliance with the allowable emissions rates of all the diesel generators (P001-P005) located at this facility. The test shall be conducted in accordance with the following requirements:
 - a. The emission testing shall be conducted approximately 2.5 years after permit issuance.
 - b. The emission testing shall be conducted to demonstrate compliance with the allowable mass emission rates for all emitted pollutants (NOx, CO, VOC, SO₂, and PE).
 - c. The following test methods shall be employed to demonstrate compliance with the allowable mass emission rates:

<u>Pollutant</u>	<u>Applicable USEPA Test Method*</u>
NOx	Methods 1-4 and 7
PE	Methods 1-5
SO ₂	Methods 1-4 and 6
VOC	Methods 1-4 and 18, 25, or 25A
CO	Methods 1-4 and 10

Alternative U.S. EPA approved test methods may be used with prior approval from the Ohio EPA.

*Applicable USEPA Test Methods can be found in 40 CFR Part 60, Appendix A.

- d. The test shall be conducted while the emissions unit is operating at or near its maximum capacity, unless otherwise specified or approved by the appropriate Ohio EPA District Office or local air agency.



Not later than 30 days prior to the proposed test date(s), the permittee shall submit an "Intent to Test" notification to the appropriate Ohio EPA District Office or local air agency. The "Intent to Test" notification shall describe in detail the proposed test methods and procedures, the emissions unit operating parameters, the time(s) and date(s) of the test(s), and the person(s) who will be conducting the test(s). Failure to submit such notification for review and approval prior to the test(s) may result in the Ohio EPA District Office's or local air agency's refusal to accept the results of the emission test(s).

Personnel from the appropriate Ohio EPA District Office or local air agency shall be permitted to witness the test(s), examine the testing equipment, and acquire data and information necessary to ensure that the operation of the emissions unit and the testing procedures provide a valid characterization of the emissions from the emissions unit and/or the performance of the control equipment.

A comprehensive written report on the results of the emissions test(s) shall be signed by the person or persons responsible for the tests and submitted to the appropriate Ohio EPA District Office or local air agency within 30 days following completion of the test(s). The permittee may request additional time for the submittal of the written report, where warranted, with prior approval from the appropriate Ohio EPA District Office or local air agency.

- (2) Compliance with the emission limitations specified in section b)(1) of these terms and conditions shall be determined in accordance with the following methods:

a. Emission Limitations:

54.8 lbs NO_x/hr

0.95 lb PE/hr

16.8 lbs CO/hr

1.4 lbs VOC/hr

Applicable Compliance Method:

The permittee shall demonstrate compliance with the emission limitations based on the performance testing as specified in section f)(1).

b. Emission Limitations:

12.38 tons NO_x per rolling 12-month period*

Applicable Compliance Method:

Compliance with the NO_x limitation above shall be demonstrated through the recordkeeping requirements in section d)(1) of the terms and conditions of this permit.

c. Emission Limitation:

Visible PE shall not exceed 5% opacity, as a six-minute average except for a one hour period during the startup of the engine. Visible particulate emissions during this one hour period shall not exceed 20% opacity on a six minute average.

Applicable Compliance Method:

If required, the permittee shall demonstrate compliance with the visible PE limitation above in accordance with Method 9 of 40 CFR, Part 60, Appendix A.



- d. Emission Limitation:
7.68 lbs SO₂/hr

Applicable Compliance Method:

The permittee shall demonstrate compliance with the hourly SO₂ limitation based on the performance testing as specified in section f)(1).

The hourly emission limitation represents the potential to emit of the emissions unit based on the maximum heat input rate (15.36 mmBtu/hr), and an emission factor of 1.01(S) lbs SO₂/mmBtu (AP-42 Table 3.4-1, dated 10/96), where S equals the maximum percent sulfur content of the fuel (0.5). Therefore, no monitoring and recordkeeping, reporting, or compliance method calculations are required to demonstrate compliance with these limitations. The record keeping and analysis requirements specified in sections d)(3) and d)(4) of the terms and conditions of this permit shall be used to verify the sulfur content of the fuel.

(1) The specific operations(s), property, and/or equipment that constitute each emissions unit along with the applicable rules and/or requirements and with the applicable emissions limitations and/or control measures. Emissions from each unit shall not exceed the listed limitations, and the listed control measures shall be specified in narrative form following the table.

- (2) Additional Terms and Conditions
 - a. The emission limitations specified by this rule is equivalent to the emission limitation established pursuant to OAC rule 3745-31-05(A)(3).
 - b. The emission limitation specified by this rule is less stringent than the emission limitation established pursuant to OAC rule 3745-31-05(A)(3).
- c) Operational Restrictions
 - (1) The maximum annual operating hours for each emissions unit shall not exceed 750 hours based upon a rolling, 12-month summation.
 - (2) The permittee shall burn only number two fuel oil in each emission unit. The number two oil shall contain less than 0.5% sulfur by weight.
 - (3) These emission units have been in operation for over 12 months and, for the purposes of demonstrating compliance with the first 12 months of the rolling restriction, the permittee shall use existing records verified by the Ohio EPA, Northwest District Office.
- d) Monitoring and/or Recordkeeping Requirements
 - (1) The permittee shall maintain monthly records of the following information for emission units: P002, P003, P004, and P005.
 - a. the total hours of operation per month
 - b. the rolling, 12-month summation of the total hours of operation;
 - c. the calculated emissions of NO_x, in tons; and
 - d. the rolling, 12-month summation of NO_x, in tons.
 - (2) For each day during which the permittee burns a fuel other than number two fuel oil, the permittee shall maintain a record of the type and quantity of fuel burned in this emissions unit.
 - (3) For each shipment of oil received for burning in this emissions unit, the permittee shall maintain records of the total quantity of oil received and the permittee's or oil supplier's analysis for sulfur content and heat content.
 - (4) The permittee shall collect or require the oil supplier to collect a representative grab sample for each shipment of oil that is received for burning in this emissions unit. The permittee shall perform or require the supplier to perform the analysis for sulfur content and heat content in accordance with the following ASTM methods: ASTM method D4294, ASTM method D240, or ASTM method 6010 for sulfur content; and ASTM method D240 for heat content. Alternative, equivalent methods may be used upon written approval by the appropriate Ohio EPA District Office or local air agency.



e) Reporting Requirements

- (1) Annual Permit Evaluation Report (PER) forms will be mailed to the permittee at the end of the reporting period specified in the Authorization section of this permit. The permittee shall submit the PER in the form and manner provided by the director by the due date identified in the Authorization section of this permit. The permit evaluation report shall cover a reporting period of no more than twelve-months for each air contaminant source identified in this permit.
- (2) The permittee shall submit quarterly deviation (excursion) reports which identify all exceedances of the 750 hours of operation per rolling 12-month period for emission units P002, P003, P004, and P005 individually. These reports are due by the date described in the Standard Terms and Conditions of this permit.

f) Testing Requirements

- (1) The permittee shall conduct, or have conducted, emission testing for one of the following emission units contained in this PTIO: P002-P005. The result of this test will be used to demonstrate compliance with the allowable emissions rates of all the diesel generators (P001-P005) located at this facility. The test shall be conducted in accordance with the following requirements:
 - a. The emission testing shall be conducted approximately 2.5 years after permit issuance.
 - b. The emission testing shall be conducted to demonstrate compliance with the allowable mass emission rates for all emitted pollutants (NOx, CO, VOC, SO₂, and PE).
 - c. The following test methods shall be employed to demonstrate compliance with the allowable mass emission rates:

Alternative U.S. EPA approved test methods may be used with prior approval from the Ohio EPA.

*Applicable USEPA Test Methods can be found in 40 CFR Part 60, Appendix A.

- d. The test shall be conducted while the emissions unit is operating at or near its maximum capacity, unless otherwise specified or approved by the appropriate Ohio EPA District Office or local air agency.

Not later than 30 days prior to the proposed test date(s), the permittee shall submit an "Intent to Test" notification to the appropriate Ohio EPA District Office or local air agency. The "Intent to Test" notification shall describe in detail the proposed test



methods and procedures, the emissions unit operating parameters, the time(s) and date(s) of the test(s), and the person(s) who will be conducting the test(s). Failure to submit such notification for review and approval prior to the test(s) may result in the Ohio EPA District Office's or local air agency's refusal to accept the results of the emission test(s).

Personnel from the appropriate Ohio EPA District Office or local air agency shall be permitted to witness the test(s), examine the testing equipment, and acquire data and information necessary to ensure that the operation of the emissions unit and the testing procedures provide a valid characterization of the emissions from the emissions unit and/or the performance of the control equipment.

A comprehensive written report on the results of the emissions test(s) shall be signed by the person or persons responsible for the tests and submitted to the appropriate Ohio EPA District Office or local air agency within 30 days following completion of the test(s). The permittee may request additional time for the submittal of the written report, where warranted, with prior approval from the appropriate Ohio EPA District Office or local air agency.

(2) Compliance with the emission limitations specified in section b)(1) of these terms and conditions shall be determined in accordance with the following methods:

a. Emission Limitations:

58.2 lbs NO_x/hr
1.0 lb PE/hr
12.2 lbs CO/hr
1.0 lb VOC/hr

Applicable Compliance Method:

The permittee shall demonstrate compliance with the emission limitations based on the performance testing as specified in section f)(1).

b. Emission Limitations:

21.83 tons NO_x per rolling 12-month period*

Applicable Compliance Method:

Compliance with the NO_x limitation above shall be demonstrated through the recordkeeping requirements in section d)(1) of the terms and conditions of this permit.

c. Emission Limitation:

Visible PE shall not exceed 5% opacity as a six-minute average except for a one hour period during the startup of the engine. Visible particulate emissions during this one hour period shall not exceed 20% opacity on a six minute average.

Applicable Compliance Method:

If required, the permittee shall demonstrate compliance with the visible PE limitation above in accordance with Method 9 of 40 CFR, Part 60, Appendix A.

d. Emission Limitation:

8.03 lbs SO₂/hr



Applicable Compliance Method:

The permittee shall demonstrate compliance with the hourly SO₂ limitation based on the performance testing as specified in section f)(1).

The hourly emission limitation represents the potential to emit of the emissions unit based on the maximum heat input rate (16.06 mmBtu/hr), and an emission factor of 1.01(S) lbs SO₂/mmBtu (AP-42 Table 3.4-1, dated 10/96), where S equals the maximum percent sulfur content of the fuel (0.5). Therefore, no monitoring and recordkeeping, reporting, or compliance method calculations are required to demonstrate compliance with these limitations. The record keeping and analysis requirements specified in sections d)(3) and d)(4) of the terms and conditions of this permit shall be used to verify the sulfur content of the fuel.

g) Miscellaneous Requirements
