Part I - GENERAL TERMS AND CONDITIONS

A. State and Federally Enforceable Permit-To-Install General Terms and Conditions

1. Monitoring and Related Recordkeeping and Reporting Requirements

- a. Except as may otherwise be provided in the terms and conditions for a specific emissions unit, the permittee shall maintain records that include the following, where applicable, for any required monitoring under this permit:
 - i. The date, place (as defined in the permit), and time of sampling or measurements.
 - ii. The date(s) analyses were performed.
 - iii. The company or entity that performed the analyses.
 - iv. The analytical techniques or methods used.
 - v. The results of such analyses.
 - vi. The operating conditions existing at the time of sampling or measurement.
- b. Each record of any monitoring data, testing data, and support information required pursuant to this permit shall be retained for a period of five years from the date the record was created. Support information shall include, but not be limited to, all calibration and maintenance records and all original strip-chart recordings for continuous monitoring instrumentation, and copies of all reports required by this permit. Such records may be maintained in computerized form.
- c. Except as may otherwise be provided in the terms and conditions for a specific emissions unit, the permittee shall submit required reports in the following manner:
 - i. Reports of any required monitoring and/or recordkeeping of federally enforceable information shall be submitted to the appropriate Ohio EPA District Office or local air agency.
 - ii. Quarterly written reports of (i) any deviations from federally enforceable emission limitations, operational restrictions, and control device operating parameter limitations, excluding deviations resulting from malfunctions reported in accordance with OAC rule 3745-15-06, that have been detected by the testing, monitoring and recordkeeping requirements specified in this permit, (ii) the probable cause of such deviations, and (iii) any corrective actions or preventive measures taken, shall be made to

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the appropriate Ohio EPA District Office or local air agency. The written reports shall be submitted (i.e., postmarked) quarterly, by January 31, April 30, July 31, and October 31 of each year and shall cover the previous calendar quarters. See B.9 below if no deviations occurred during the quarter.

- iii. Written reports, which identify any deviations from the federally enforceable monitoring, recordkeeping, and reporting requirements contained in this permit shall be submitted (i.e., postmarked) to the appropriate Ohio EPA District Office or local air agency every six months, by January 31 and July 31 of each year for the previous six calendar months. If no deviations occurred during a six-month period, the permittee shall submit a semi-annual report, which states that no deviations occurred during that period.
 - iv. If this permit is for an emissions unit located at a Title V facility, then each written report shall be signed by a responsible official certifying that, based on information and belief formed after reasonable inquiry, the statements and information in the report are true, accurate, and complete.
- d. The permittee shall report actual emissions pursuant to OAC Chapter 3745-78 for the purpose of collecting Air Pollution Control Fees.

2. Scheduled Maintenance/Malfunction Reporting

Any scheduled maintenance of air pollution control equipment shall be performed in accordance with paragraph (A) of OAC rule 3745-15-06. The malfunction, i.e., upset, of any emissions units or any associated air pollution control system(s) shall be reported to the appropriate Ohio EPA District Office or local air agency in accordance with paragraph (B) of OAC rule 3745-15-06. (The definition of an upset condition shall be the same as that used in OAC rule 3745-15-06(B)(1) for a malfunction.) The verbal and written reports shall be submitted pursuant to OAC rule 3745-15-06.

Except as provided in that rule, any scheduled maintenance or malfunction necessitating the shutdown or bypassing of any air pollution control system(s) shall be accompanied by the shutdown of the emission unit(s) that is (are) served by such control system(s).

3. Risk Management Plans

If the permittee is required to develop and register a risk management plan pursuant to section 112(r) of the Clean Air Act, as amended, 42 U.S.C. 7401 et seq. ("Act"), the permittee shall comply with the requirement to register such a plan.

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4. Title IV Provisions

If the permittee is subject to the requirements of 40 CFR Part 72 concerning acid rain, the permittee shall ensure that any affected emissions unit complies with those requirements. Emissions exceeding any allowances that are lawfully held under Title IV of the Act, or any regulations adopted thereunder, are prohibited.

5. Severability Clause

A determination that any term or condition of this permit is invalid shall not invalidate the force or effect of any other term or condition thereof, except to the extent that any other term or condition depends in whole or in part for its operation or implementation upon the term or condition declared invalid.

6. General Requirements

- a. The permittee must comply with all terms and conditions of this permit. Any noncompliance with the federally enforceable terms and conditions of this permit constitutes a violation of the Act, and is grounds for enforcement action or for permit revocation, revocation and re-issuance, or modification
- b. It shall not be a defense for the permittee in an enforcement action that it would have been necessary to halt or reduce the permitted activity in order to maintain compliance with the federally enforceable terms and conditions of this permit.
- c. This permit may be modified, revoked, or revoked and reissued, for cause. The filing of a request by the permittee for a permit modification, revocation and reissuance, or revocation, or of a notification of planned changes or anticipated noncompliance does not stay any term and condition of this permit.
- d. This permit does not convey any property rights of any sort, or any exclusive privilege.
- e. The permittee shall furnish to the Director of the Ohio EPA, or an authorized representative of the Director, upon receipt of a written request and within a reasonable time, any information that may be requested to determine whether cause exists for modifying or revoking this permit or to determine compliance with this permit. Upon request, the permittee shall also furnish to the Director or an authorized representative of the Director, copies of records required to be kept by this permit. For information claimed to be confidential in the submittal to the Director, if the Administrator of the U.S. EPA requests such information, the permittee may furnish such records directly to the Administrator along with a claim of confidentiality.

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7. Fees

The permittee shall pay fees to the Director of the Ohio EPA in accordance with ORC section 3745.11 and OAC Chapter 3745-78. The permittee shall pay all applicable permit-to-install fees within 30 days after the issuance of any permit-to-install. The permittee shall pay all applicable permit-to-operate fees within thirty days of the issuance of the invoice.

8. Federal and State Enforceability

Only those terms and conditions designated in this permit as federally enforceable, that are required under the Act, or any its applicable requirements, including relevant provisions designed to limit the potential to emit of a source, are enforceable by the Administrator of the U.S. EPA and the State and by citizens (to the extent allowed by section 304 of the Act) under the Act. All other terms and conditions of this permit shall not be federally enforceable and shall be enforceable under State law only.

9. Compliance Requirements

- a. Any document (including reports) required to be submitted and required by a federally applicable requirement in this permit shall include a certification by a responsible official that, based on information and belief formed after reasonable inquiry, the statements in the document are true, accurate, and complete.
- b. Upon presentation of credentials and other documents as may be required by law, the permittee shall allow the Director of the Ohio EPA or an authorized representative of the Director to:
 - i. At reasonable times, enter upon the permittee's premises where a source is located or the emissions-related activity is conducted, or where records must be kept under the conditions of this permit.
 - ii. Have access to and copy, at reasonable times, any records that must be kept under the conditions of this permit, subject to the protection from disclosure to the public of confidential information consistent with ORC section 3704.08.
 - iii. Inspect at reasonable times any facilities, equipment (including monitoring and air pollution control equipment), practices, or operations regulated or required under this permit.

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- iv. As authorized by the Act, sample or monitor at reasonable times substances or parameters for the purpose of assuring compliance with the permit and applicable requirements.
- c. The permittee shall submit progress reports to the appropriate Ohio EPA District Office or local air agency concerning any schedule of compliance for meeting an applicable requirement. Progress reports shall be submitted semiannually, or more frequently if specified in the applicable requirement or by the Director of the Ohio EPA. Progress reports shall contain the following:
 - i. Dates for achieving the activities, milestones, or compliance required in any schedule of compliance, and dates when such activities, milestones, or compliance were achieved.
 - ii. An explanation of why any dates in any schedule of compliance were not or will not be met, and any preventive or corrective measures adopted.

10. Permit-To-Operate Application

- a. If the permittee is required to apply for a Title V permit pursuant to OAC Chapter 3745-77, the permittee shall submit a complete Title V permit application or a complete Title V permit modification application within twelve (12) months after commencing operation of the emissions units covered by this permit. However, if the proposed new or modified source(s) would be prohibited by the terms and conditions of an existing Title V permit, a Title V permit modification must be obtained before the operation of such new or modified source(s) pursuant to OAC rule 3745-77-04(D) and OAC rule 3745-77-08(C)(3)(d).
- b. If the permittee is required to apply for permit(s) pursuant to OAC Chapter 3745-35, the source(s) identified in this permit is (are) permitted to operate for a period of up to one year from the date the source(s) commenced operation. Permission to operate is granted only if the facility complies with all requirements contained in this permit and all applicable air pollution laws, regulations, and policies. Pursuant to OAC Chapter 3745-35, the permittee shall submit a complete operating permit application within ninety (90) days after commencing operation of the source(s) covered by this permit.

11. Best Available Technology

As specified in OAC Rule 3745-31-05, all new sources must employ Best Available Technology (BAT). Compliance with the terms and conditions of this permit will fulfill this requirement.

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12. Air Pollution Nuisance

The air contaminants emitted by the emissions units covered by this permit shall not cause a public nuisance, in violation of OAC rule 3745-15-07.

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13. Permit-To-Install

A permit-to-install must be obtained pursuant to OAC Chapter 3745-31 prior to "installation" of "any air contaminant source" as defined in OAC rule 3745-31-01, or "modification", as defined in OAC rule 3745-31-01, of any emissions unit included in this permit.

B. State Only Enforceable Permit-To-Install General Terms and Conditions

1. Compliance Requirements

The emissions unit(s) identified in this Permit shall remain in full compliance with all applicable State laws and regulations and the terms and conditions of this permit.

2. Reporting Requirements

The permittee shall submit required reports in the following manner:

- a. Reports of any required monitoring and/or recordkeeping of state-only enforceable information shall be submitted to the appropriate Ohio EPA District Office or local air agency.
- b. Except as otherwise may be provided in the terms and conditions for a specific emissions unit, quarterly written reports of (a) any deviations (excursions) from state-only required emission limitations, operational restrictions, and control device operating parameter limitations that have been detected by the testing, monitoring, and recordkeeping requirements specified in this permit, (b) the probable cause of such deviations, and (c) any corrective actions or preventive measures which have been or will be taken, shall be submitted to the appropriate Ohio EPA District Office or local air agency. If no deviations occurred during a calendar quarter, the permittee shall submit a quarterly report, which states that no deviations occurred during that quarter. The reports shall be submitted (i.e., postmarked) quarterly, by January 31, April 30, July 31, and October 31 of each year and shall cover the previous calendar quarters. (These quarterly reports shall exclude deviations resulting from malfunctions reported in accordance with OAC rule 3745-15-06.)

3. Permit Transfers

Any transferee of this permit shall assume the responsibilities of the prior permit holder.

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The appropriate Ohio EPA District Office or local air agency must be notified in writing of any transfer of this permit.

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4. Authorization To Install or Modify

If applicable, authorization to install or modify any new or existing emissions unit included in this permit shall terminate within eighteen months of the effective date of the permit if the owner or operator has not undertaken a continuing program of installation or modification or has not entered into a binding contractual obligation to undertake and complete within a reasonable time a continuing program of installation or modification. This deadline may be extended by up to 12 months if application is made to the Director within a reasonable time before the termination date and the party shows good cause for any such extension.

5. Construction of New Sources(s)

This permit does not constitute an assurance that the proposed source will operate in compliance with all Ohio laws and regulations. This permit does not constitute expressed or implied assurance that the proposed facility has been constructed in accordance with the application and terms and conditions of this permit. The action of beginning and/or completing construction prior to obtaining the Director's approval constitutes a violation of OAC rule 3745-31-02. Furthermore, issuance of this permit does not constitute an assurance that the proposed source will operate in compliance with all Ohio laws and regulations. Issuance of this permit is not to be construed as a waiver of any rights that the Ohio Environmental Protection Agency (or other persons) may have against the applicant for starting construction prior to the effective date of the permit. Additional facilities shall be installed upon orders of the Ohio Environmental Protection Agency if the proposed facilities cannot meet the requirements of this permit or cannot meet applicable standards.

6. Public Disclosure

The facility is hereby notified that this permit, and all agency records concerning the operation of this permitted source, are subject to public disclosure in accordance with OAC rule 3745-49-03.

7. Applicability

This Permit to Install is applicable only to the emissions unit(s) identified in the Permit To Install. Separate application must be made to the Director for the installation or modification of any other emissions unit(s).

8. Construction Compliance Certification

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If applicable, the applicant shall provide Ohio EPA with a written certification (see enclosed form if applicable) that the facility has been constructed in accordance with the permit-to-install application and the terms and conditions of the permit-to-install. The certification shall be provided to Ohio EPA upon completion of construction but prior to startup of the source.

9. Additional Reporting Requirements When There Are No Deviations of Federally Enforceable Emission Limitations, Operational Restrictions, or Control Device Operating Parameter Limitations (See Section A of This Permit)

If no deviations occurred during a calendar quarter, the permittee shall submit a quarterly report, which states that no deviations occurred during that quarter. The reports shall be submitted quarterly (i.e., postmarked), by January 31, April 30, July 31, and October 31 of each year and shall cover the previous calendar quarters.

The actual usage of Hazardous Air Pollutants (HAPs), as identified in Section 112(b) of Title III of the Clean Air Act, from all non-insignificant emissions units at this facility shall not exceed 9.0 TPY* for any single HAP and 22.5 TPY* for any combination of HAPs. Compliance with the above limitations shall be based on a rolling, 12-month summation.

2. Additional Terms and Conditions

2.a The emission limitations for PM₁₀, SO₂, NO_x, CO and VOC from the combustion of natural gas and/or propane in the drying ovens are established to reflect potentials to emit for this emissions unit. Therefore, no additional monitoring, record keeping and/or reporting requirements are necessary to ensure compliance with these limitations.

2.b The permittee has satisfied the "best available control techniques and operating practices" and "latest available control techniques and operating practices" required pursuant to OAC rules 3745-21-08 and 3745-23-06, respectively by committing to comply with the best available technology (BAT) and best available control technology (BACT) requirements established pursuant to this permit to install.

On November 5, 2002, OAC rule 3745-21-08 was revised to delete paragraph (B); therefore, paragraph (B) is no longer part of the State regulations. However, that rule revision has not yet been submitted to the U.S. EPA as a revision to Ohio's State Implementation Plan (SIP). Therefore, until the SIP revision occurs and the U.S. EPA approves the revisions to OAC rule 3745-21-08, the requirement to satisfy the "best available control techniques and operating practices" still exists as part of the federally approved SIP for Ohio.

On February 15, 2005, OAC rule 3745-23-06 was rescinded; therefore, it is no longer part of the State regulations. However, that rule revision has not yet been submitted to the U.S. EPA as a revision to Ohio's State Implementation Plan (SIP). Therefore, until the SIP revision occurs and the U.S. EPA approves the revisions to OAC rule 3745-23-06, the requirement to satisfy the "latest available control techniques and operating practices" still exists as part of the federally approved SIP for Ohio.

2.c The actual usage of Hazardous Air Pollutants (HAPs), as identified in Section 112(b) of Title III of the Clean Air Act, from all non-insignificant emissions units at this facility shall not exceed 9.0 TPY* for any single HAP and 22.5 TPY* for any combination of HAPs. Compliance with the above limitations shall be based on a rolling, 12-month summation.

Emissions Unit ID: K006

*This assumes the HAPs emitted are the same as the amount of HAPs used since all HAPs used evaporate.

II. Operational Restrictions

1. The permittee shall burn only natural gas and/or propane as fuel in this emissions unit.
2. The combined emissions of VOC from emissions units K005 through K009, inclusive, shall not exceed 14.87 tons per rolling, 12-month period, calculated according to the following formula:

$$[\text{SUM of all } \{(P_i)(VOC_i) \div 2000\} - \{(R_p)(P_o)(VOC_o) \div 2000\}]$$

where:

P_i = usage of each coating, cleanup, or restoration material in gallons;

VOC_i = volatile Organic compound content of each coating, cleanup, or restoration material in pounds VOC per gallon;

R_p = ratio of solvent used on emissions units K005 through K009 to (total solvent used on all emissions units - the amount of solvent used on emissions unit K045);

P_o = total gallons of recovered solvents less the gallons of solvent recovered from emissions unit K045, for the subject time period; and

VOC_o = VOC content of recovered solvents in pounds of VOC per gallon

III. Monitoring and/or Recordkeeping Requirements

1. The permittee shall collect and record the following information each day this emissions unit is in operation:
 - a. the name and identification number of each coating employed;
 - b. the volume, in gallons, of each coating employed;
 - c. the total volume, in gallons, of all the coatings employed; and
 - d. the VOC content of each coating employed, in lbs/gallon of coating.
2. The permittee shall collect and record the following information each month for emissions units K005 through K009, combined:
 - a. the name or identification number for each coating and cleanup/restoration solvent employed;

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- b. the VOC content of each coating and cleanup/restoration solvent material employed, in pounds per gallon, as applied;
 - c. the volume, in gallons, of each coating and cleanup/restoration solvent material employed;
 - d. the VOC emissions, in tons, as determined by the equation in Section A.II.2. of these terms and conditions; and
 - e. the rolling, 12-month VOC emissions, in tons.
3. For each day during which the permittee burns fuel other than natural gas or propane in this emissions unit, the permittee shall maintain a record of the type and quantity of fuel burned.
4. The permittee shall collect and record the following information each month for the HAP(s) employed in all non-insignificant emissions units at this facility:
 - a. the emission unit's source identification and description that Hazardous Air Pollutant (HAP) containing materials were employed;
 - b. the name and identification number of each HAP containing material employed;
 - c. the individual HAP* content for each HAP containing material employed, in pounds of individual HAP per gallon, as employed;
 - d. The amount of each HAP containing material employed, in gallons;
 - e. the total individual HAP usage for each HAP from the above listed materials employed, in pounds or tons per month [for each HAP the sum of (c) times (d)];
 - f. the total combined HAP usage from all above listed materials employed, in pounds or tons per month [the sum of (c) times (d) for each coating];
 - g. the updated rolling, 12-month summation of usage for each individual HAP**, in pounds or tons. This shall include the information for the current month and the preceding eleven calendar months; and
 - h. the updated rolling, 12-month summation of usage for total combined HAP**, in

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pounds or tons. This shall include the information for the current month and the preceding eleven calendar months.

2. Additional Terms and Conditions

- 2.a** The permittee has satisfied the "best available control techniques and operating practices" and "latest available control techniques and operating practices" required pursuant to OAC rules 3745-21-07(B), respectively by committing to comply with the best available technology (BAT) and best available control technology (BACT) requirements established pursuant to this permit to install.
- 2.b** On November 5, 2002, OAC rule 3745-21-08 was revised to delete paragraph (B); therefore, paragraph (B) is no longer part of the State regulations. However, that rule revision has not yet been submitted to the U.S. EPA as a revision to Ohio's State Implementation Plan (SIP). Therefore, until the SIP revision occurs and the U.S. EPA approves the revisions to OAC rule 3745-21-08, the requirement to satisfy the "best available control techniques and operating practices" still exists as part of the federally approved SIP for Ohio.
- 2.c** The actual usage of Hazardous Air Pollutants (HAPs), as identified in Section 112(b) of Title III of the Clean Air Act, from all non-insignificant emissions units at this facility shall not exceed 9.0 TPY* for any single HAP and 22.5 TPY* for any combination of HAPs. Compliance with the above limitations shall be based on a rolling, 12-month summation.

II. Operational Restrictions

1. The volatile organic compound (VOC) emissions shall not exceed 3.5 pounds per gallon of coating, excluding water and exempt solvents, for an extreme performance coating.
2. The cleanup materials employed in this emissions unit shall only be non-volatile organic materials.

III. Monitoring and/or Recordkeeping Requirements

1. The permittee shall collect and record the following information each month for the line:
 - a. the name and identification number of each coating, as applied; and

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- b. the VOC content of each coating (excluding water and exempt solvents), as applied.
2. The permittee shall collect and record the following information for the purpose of determining annual VOC emissions:
 - a. the name and identification of each cleanup material employed;
 - b. the VOC content of each cleanup material, in pounds per gallon;
 - c. the number of gallons of each cleanup material employed;
 - d. the number of gallons (excluding water and exempt solvents) of each coating employed; and
 - e. the total VOC emissions from all coatings and cleanup materials employed, in pounds or tons.
3. The permittee shall collect and record the following information each month for the line:
 - a. The name and identification number of each coating, as applied.
 - b. The VOC content of each coating (excluding water and exempt solvents), as applied.
 - c. The number of gallons (excluding water and exempt solvents) of each coating employed.
4. The permittee shall collect and record the following information each month for the HAP(s) employed in all non-insignificant emissions units at this facility:
 - a. the emission unit's source identification and description that Hazardous Air Pollutant (HAP) containing materials were employed;
 - b. the name and identification number of each HAP containing material employed;
 - c. the individual HAP* content for each HAP containing material employed, in pounds of individual HAP per gallon, as employed;
 - d. The amount of each HAP containing material employed, in gallons;

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- e. the total individual HAP usage for each HAP from the above listed materials employed, in pounds or tons per month [for each HAP the sum of (c) times (d)];
- f. the total combined HAP usage from all above listed materials employed, in pounds or tons per month [the sum of (c) times (d) for each coating];
- g. the updated rolling, 12-month summation of usage for each individual HAP**, in pounds or tons. This shall include the information for the current month and the preceding eleven calendar months; and
- h. the updated rolling, 12-month summation of usage for total combined HAP**, in pounds or tons. This shall include the information for the current month and the preceding eleven calendar months.

* A listing of the HAPs can be found in Section 112(b) of the Clean Air Act or can be obtained by contacting your Ohio EPA, Southwest District Office contact. This information does not have to be kept on a line-by-line basis.

IV. Reporting Requirements

1. The permittee shall notify the Director (the appropriate Ohio EPA District Office or local air agency) in writing of any monthly record showing the use of noncomplying coatings. The notification shall include a copy of such record and shall be sent to the Director (the appropriate Ohio EPA District Office or local air agency) within 30 days following the end of the calendar month.
2. The permittee shall also submit annual reports that specify the total VOC emissions from this emissions unit for the previous calendar year. These reports shall be submitted by April 15 of each year. This reporting requirement may be satisfied by including and identifying the specific emission data for this emissions unit in the annual Fee Emission Report.
3. The permittee shall notify the Director of any monthly record showing the use of noncomplying coatings. A copy of such record shall be sent to the Director within 30 days following the end of the calendar month.
4. The permittee shall submit the following quarterly deviation (excursion) reports, in

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accordance with the General Terms and Conditions of this permit, for the following information:

- a. an identification of each month during which the individual HAP emissions from all non-insignificant emissions units at the facility exceeded 9.0 tons per year, based on a 12-month rolling average; and
- b. an identification of each month during which the combined HAP emissions from all non-insignificant emissions units at the facility exceeded 22.5 tons per year, based on a 12-month rolling average.

V. Testing Requirements

1. Compliance with the emission limitation(s) in Section A.1. of these terms and conditions shall be determined in accordance with the following method(s):

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a. Emission Limitation:

The VOC content of the coatings shall not exceed 3.50 pounds per gallon of coating.

Applicable Compliance Method:

Compliance with the allowable VOC content limitation above shall be demonstrated through the record keeping requirements as established in Section A.III.1 of this permit.

b. Emission Limitation:

Visible particulate emissions from any stack shall not exceed 20 percent opacity as a six-minute average, except as specified by rule.

Applicable Compliance Method:

Compliance shall be determined through visible emission observations performed in accordance with 40 CFR Part 60, Appendix A, Method 9 and the procedures specified in OAC rule 3745-17-03(B)(1).

- iii. for PE, Methods 1 - 5 of 40 CFR Part 60, Appendix A;
- iv. for PM₁₀, Methods 201 and 202 of 40 CFR Part 60, Appendix A;
- v. for SO₂, Methods 1 - 4 and 10 of 40 CFR Part 60, Appendix A; and
- vi. for VOC, Methods 18, 25, or 25A, as appropriate, of 40 CFR Part 60, Appendix A.

Compliance with the annual allowable emission limitations above shall be ensured as long as compliance with the hourly allowable emission limitations is maintained (the annual allowable limitations were determined by multiplying the hourly allowable limitations by 8760, and then dividing by 2000).

2. Formulation data or USEPA Method 24 shall be used to determine the VOC content of each coating and cleanup/restoration solvent material.

III. Monitoring and/or Recordkeeping Requirements

1. The permit to install for this emission unit (K051) was evaluated based on the actual materials and the design parameters of the emission units as specified in the permit to install application. The Ohio EPA's "Review of New Sources of Air Toxics Emissions" policy ("Air Toxics Policy") was applied for each pollutant emitted by this emission unit using data from the permit to install application and the SCREEN 3.0 model. The predicted 1-hour maximum ground level concentration from the use of the screen 3.0 model was compared to the Maximum Acceptable Ground Level Concentration (MAGLC). The following summarizes the results of the modeling for the "worst case"usage for this pollutant.

Pollutant: Butoxyl ethanol

Maximum Hourly Emission Rate: 0.35 lbs / hour

Predicted 1-Hour Maximum Ground-Level Concentration: 2.2E-5 mg/m3 at 141 m

MAGLC: 0.57 mg/m3

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2. Physical changes or changes in the method of operation of the emission unit after its installation or modification could affect the parameters used to determine whether or not the "Air Toxics Policy" is satisfied. Consequently, prior to making a change that could impact such parameters, the permittee shall conduct an evaluation to determine that the "Air Toxics Policy" will be satisfied. If, upon evaluation, the permittee determines that the "Air Toxics Policy" will not be satisfied, the permittee will not make the change. Changes that affect the parameters used in applying the "Air Toxics Policy" include the following:
 - a. changes in the composition of the materials used, or the use of new materials, that would result in the emission of a compound with a lower Threshold Limit Value (TLV), as indicated by the most recent version of the handbook entitled "American Governmental Industrial Hygienists (ACGIH)," than the lowest TLV previously modeled;
 - b. Changes in the composition of the materials, or use of new materials, that would result in an increase in emissions of any pollutant with a listed TLV that was proposed in the application and modeled; and
 - c. Physical changes to the emissions unit or its exhaust parameters (e.g., increased/decreased exhaust flow, changes in stack height, changes in stack diameter, etc.).

If the permittee determines that the "Air Toxics Policy" will be satisfied for the above changes, the Ohio EPA will not consider the change(s) to be a "modification" under OAC rule 3745-31-01 (VV)(1)(a)(ii), and a modification of the existing permit to install will not be required. If the change(s) is (are) defined as a modification under other provisions of the modification definition (other than (VV)(1)(a)(ii), then the permittee shall obtain a final permit to install prior to the change.
