## Part I - GENERAL TERMS AND CONDITIONS

### A. State and Federally Enforceable Permit To Install General Terms and Conditions

#### 1. Monitoring and Related Recordkeeping and Reporting Requirements

- a. Except as may otherwise be provided in the terms and conditions for a specific emissions unit, the permittee shall maintain records that include the following, where applicable, for any required monitoring under this permit:
  - i. The date, place (as defined in the permit), and time of sampling or measurements.
  - ii. The date(s) analyses were performed.
  - iii. The company or entity that performed the analyses.
  - iv. The analytical techniques or methods used.
  - v. The results of such analyses.
  - vi. The operating conditions existing at the time of sampling or measurement.
- b. Each record of any monitoring data, testing data, and support information required pursuant to this permit shall be retained for a period of five years from the date the record was created. Support information shall include, but not be limited to, all calibration and maintenance records and all original strip-chart recordings for continuous monitoring instrumentation, and copies of all reports required by this permit. Such records may be maintained in computerized form.
- c. Except as may otherwise be provided in the terms and conditions for a specific emissions unit, the permittee shall submit required reports in the following manner:
  - i. Reports of any required monitoring and/or recordkeeping of federally enforceable information shall be submitted to the appropriate Ohio EPA District Office or local air agency.
  - ii. Quarterly written reports of (i) any deviations from federally enforceable emission limitations, operational restrictions, and control device operating parameter limitations, excluding deviations resulting from malfunctions reported in accordance with OAC rule 3745-15-06, that have been detected by the testing, monitoring and recordkeeping requirements specified in this permit, (ii) the probable cause of such deviations, and (iii) any corrective actions or preventive measures taken, shall be made to the appropriate Ohio EPA District Office or local air agency. The written reports shall be submitted quarterly, i.e., by January 31, April 30, July 31, and October 31 of each year and shall cover the previous

calendar quarters. See B.10 below if no deviations occurred during the quarter.

- iii. Written reports, which identify any deviations from the federally enforceable monitoring, recordkeeping, and reporting requirements contained in this permit shall be submitted to the appropriate Ohio EPA District Office or local air agency every six months, i.e., by January 31 and July 31 of each year for the previous six calendar months. If no deviations occurred during a six-month period, the permittee shall submit a semi-annual report, which states that no deviations occurred during that period.
- iv. Each written report shall be signed by a responsible official certifying that, based on information and belief formed after reasonable inquiry, the statements and information in the report are true, accurate, and complete.

## **2. Scheduled Maintenance/Malfunction Reporting**

Any scheduled maintenance of air pollution control equipment shall be performed in accordance with paragraph (A) of OAC rule 3745-15-06. The malfunction, i.e., upset, of any emissions units or any associated air pollution control system(s) shall be reported to the appropriate Ohio EPA District Office or local air agency in accordance with paragraph (B) of OAC rule 3745-15-06. (The definition of an upset condition shall be the same as that used in OAC rule 3745-15-06(B)(1) for a malfunction.) The verbal and written reports shall be submitted pursuant to OAC rule 3745-15-06.

Except as provided in that rule, any scheduled maintenance or malfunction necessitating the shutdown or bypassing of any air pollution control system(s) shall be accompanied by the shutdown of the emission unit(s) that is (are) served by such control system(s).

## **3. Risk Management Plans**

If the permittee is required to develop and register a risk management plan pursuant to section 112(r) of the Clean Air Act, as amended, 42 U.S.C. 7401 et seq. ("Act"), the permittee shall comply with the requirement to register such a plan.

## **4. Title IV Provisions**

If the permittee is subject to the requirements of 40 CFR Part 72 concerning acid rain, the permittee shall ensure that any affected emissions unit complies with those requirements. Emissions exceeding any allowances that are lawfully held under Title IV of the Act, or any regulations adopted thereunder, are prohibited.

## 5. Severability Clause

A determination that any term or condition of this permit is invalid shall not invalidate the force or effect of any other term or condition thereof, except to the extent that any other term or condition depends in whole or in part for its operation or implementation upon the term or condition declared invalid.

## 6. General Requirements

- a. The permittee must comply with all terms and conditions of this permit. Any noncompliance with the federally enforceable terms and conditions of this permit constitutes a violation of the Act, and is grounds for enforcement action or for permit revocation, revocation and reissuance, or modification, or for denial of a permit renewal application.
- b. It shall not be a defense for the permittee in an enforcement action that it would have been necessary to halt or reduce the permitted activity in order to maintain compliance with the federally enforceable terms and conditions of this permit.
- c. This permit may be modified, reopened, revoked, or revoked and reissued, for cause. The filing of a request by the permittee for a permit modification, revocation and reissuance, or revocation, or of a notification of planned changes or anticipated noncompliance does not stay any term and condition of this permit.
- d. This permit does not convey any property rights of any sort, or any exclusive privilege.
- e. The permittee shall furnish to the Director of the Ohio EPA, or an authorized representative of the Director, upon receipt of a written request and within a reasonable time, any information that may be requested to determine whether cause exists for modifying, reopening or revoking this permit or to determine compliance with this permit. Upon request, the permittee shall also furnish to the Director or an authorized representative of the Director, copies of records required to be kept by this permit. For information claimed to be confidential in the submittal to the Director, if the Administrator of the U.S. EPA requests such information, the permittee may furnish such records directly to the Administrator along with a claim of confidentiality.

## 7. Fees

The permittee shall pay fees to the Director of the Ohio EPA in accordance with ORC section 3745.11 and OAC Chapter 3745-78. The permittee shall pay all applicable Permit To Install fees within 30 days after the issuance of this Permit To Install.

## 8. Federal and State Enforceability

Only those terms and conditions designated in this permit as federally enforceable, that are

required under the Act, or any of its applicable requirements, including relevant provisions designed to limit the potential to emit of a source, are enforceable by the Administrator of the U.S. EPA, the State, and citizens under the Act. All other terms and conditions of this permit shall not be federally enforceable and shall be enforceable under State law only.

## **9. Compliance Requirements**

- a. Any document (including reports) required to be submitted and required by a federally applicable requirement in this permit shall include a certification by a responsible official that, based on information and belief formed after reasonable inquiry, the statements in the document are true, accurate, and complete.
- b. Upon presentation of credentials and other documents as may be required by law, the permittee shall allow the Director of the Ohio EPA or an authorized representative of the Director to:
  - i. At reasonable times, enter upon the permittee's premises where a source is located or the emissions-related activity is conducted, or where records must be kept under the conditions of this permit.
  - ii. Have access to and copy, at reasonable times, any records that must be kept under the conditions of this permit, subject to the protection from disclosure to the public of confidential information consistent with ORC section 3704.08.
  - iii. Inspect at reasonable times any facilities, equipment (including monitoring and air pollution control equipment), practices, or operations regulated or required under this permit.
  - iv. As authorized by the Act, sample or monitor at reasonable times substances or parameters for the purpose of assuring compliance with the permit and applicable requirements.
- c. The permittee shall submit progress reports to the appropriate Ohio EPA District Office or local air agency concerning any schedule of compliance for meeting an applicable requirement. Progress reports shall be submitted semiannually, or more frequently if specified in the applicable requirement or by the Director of the Ohio EPA. Progress reports shall contain the following:
  - i. Dates for achieving the activities, milestones, or compliance required in any schedule of compliance, and dates when such activities, milestones, or compliance were achieved.
  - ii. An explanation of why any dates in any schedule of compliance were not or will not be met, and any preventive or corrective measures adopted.

#### **10. Permit To Operate Application**

- a. If the permittee is required to apply for a Title V permit pursuant to OAC Chapter 3745-77, the permittee shall submit a complete Title V permit application or a complete Title V permit modification application within twelve (12) months after commencing operation of the emissions units covered by this permit. However, if the proposed new or modified source(s) would be prohibited by the terms and conditions of an existing Title V permit, a Title V permit modification must be obtained before the operation of such new or modified source(s) pursuant to OAC rule 3745-77-04(D) and OAC rule 3745-77-08(C)(3)(d).
- b. If the permittee is required to apply for permit(s) pursuant to OAC Chapter 3745-35, the source(s) identified in this Permit To Install is (are) permitted to operate for a period of up to one year from the date the source(s) commenced operation. Permission to operate is granted only if the facility complies with all requirements contained in this permit and all applicable air pollution laws, regulations, and policies. Pursuant to OAC Chapter 3745-35, the permittee shall submit a complete operating permit application within thirty (30) days after commencing operation of the source(s) covered by this permit.

#### **11. Best Available Technology**

As specified in OAC Rule 3745-31-05, all new sources must employ Best Available Technology (BAT). Compliance with the terms and conditions of this permit will fulfill this requirement.

**B. State Only Enforceable Permit To Install General Terms and Conditions****1. Compliance Requirements**

The emissions unit(s) identified in this Permit to Install shall remain in full compliance with all applicable State laws and regulations and the terms and conditions of this permit.

**2. Reporting Requirements Related to Monitoring and Recordkeeping Requirements**

The permittee shall submit required reports in the following manner:

- a. Reports of any required monitoring and/or recordkeeping of state-only enforceable information shall be submitted to the appropriate Ohio EPA District Office or local air agency.
- b. Except as otherwise may be provided in the terms and conditions for a specific emissions unit, quarterly written reports of (a) any deviations (excursions) from state-only required emission limitations, operational restrictions, and control device operating parameter limitations that have been detected by the testing, monitoring, and recordkeeping requirements specified in this permit, (b) the probable cause of such deviations, and (c) any corrective actions or preventive measures which have been or will be taken, shall be submitted to the appropriate Ohio EPA District Office or local air agency. If no deviations occurred during a calendar quarter, the permittee shall submit a quarterly report, which states that no deviations occurred during that quarter. The reports shall be submitted quarterly, i.e., by January 31, April 30, July 31, and October 31 of each year and shall cover the previous calendar quarters. (These quarterly reports shall exclude deviations resulting from malfunctions reported in accordance with OAC rule 3745-15-06.)

**3. Permit Transfers**

Any transferee of this permit shall assume the responsibilities of the prior permit holder. The appropriate Ohio EPA District Office or local air agency must be notified in writing of any transfer of this permit.

**4. Air Pollution Nuisance**

The air contaminants emitted by the emissions units covered by this permit shall not cause a public nuisance, in violation of OAC rule 3745-15-07.

## 5. Termination of Permit To Install

This permit to install shall terminate within eighteen months of the effective date of the permit to install if the owner or operator has not undertaken a continuing program of installation or modification or has not entered into a binding contractual obligation to undertake and complete within a reasonable time a continuing program of installation or modification. This deadline may be extended by up to 12 months if application is made to the Director within a reasonable time before the termination date and the party shows good cause for any such extension.

## 6. Construction of New Sources(s)

The proposed emissions unit(s) shall be constructed in strict accordance with the plans and application submitted for this permit to the Director of the Ohio Environmental Protection Agency. There may be no deviation from the approved plans without the express, written approval of the Agency. Any deviations from the approved plans or the above conditions may lead to such sanctions and penalties as provided under Ohio law. Approval of these plans does not constitute an assurance that the proposed facilities will operate in compliance with all Ohio laws and regulations. Additional facilities shall be installed upon orders of the Ohio Environmental Protection Agency if the proposed sources cannot meet the requirements of this permit or cannot meet applicable standards.

If the construction of the proposed emissions unit(s) has already begun or has been completed prior to the date the Director of the Environmental Protection Agency approves the permit application and plans, the approval does not constitute expressed or implied assurance that the proposed facility has been constructed in accordance with the approved plans. The action of beginning and/or completing construction prior to obtaining the Director's approval constitutes a violation of OAC rule 3745-31-02. Furthermore, issuance of the Permit to Install does not constitute an assurance that the proposed source will operate in compliance with all Ohio laws and regulations. Approval of the plans in any case is not to be construed as an approval of the facility as constructed and/or completed. Moreover, issuance of the Permit to Install is not to be construed as a waiver of any rights that the Ohio Environmental Protection Agency (or other persons) may have against the applicant for starting construction prior to the effective date of the permit. Additional facilities shall be installed upon orders of the Ohio Environmental Protection Agency if the proposed facilities cannot meet the requirements of this permit or cannot meet applicable standards.

## 7. Public Disclosure

The facility is hereby notified that this permit, and all agency records concerning the operation of this permitted source, are subject to public disclosure in accordance with OAC rule 3745-49-03.

## 8. Applicability

This Permit to Install is applicable only to the emissions unit(s) identified in the Permit To Install. Separate application must be made to the Director for the installation or modification of any other

emissions unit(s).

**9. Construction Compliance Certification**

The applicant shall provide Ohio EPA with a written certification (see enclosed form) that the facility has been constructed in accordance with the Permit To Install application and the terms and conditions of the Permit to Install. The certification shall be provided to Ohio EPA upon completion of construction but prior to startup of the source.

**10. Additional Reporting Requirements When There Are No Deviations of Federally Enforceable Emission Limitations, Operational Restrictions, or Control Device Operating Parameter Limitations (See Section A of This Permit)**

If no deviations occurred during a calendar quarter, the permittee shall submit a quarterly report, which states that no deviations occurred during that quarter. The reports shall be submitted quarterly, i.e., by January 31, April 30, July 31, and October 31 of each year and shall cover the previous calendar quarters.

**Natural Gas Emission Limits:**

nitrogen oxide (NO<sub>x</sub>) emissions shall not exceed 0.75 lb/hr and 3.29 tons per year

carbon monoxide (CO) emissions shall not exceed 1.26 lbs/hr, and 5.52 tons per year

particulate matter (PM) emissions shall not exceed 0.020 lb/MMBtu of actual heat input, and 1.28 tons per year

**#2 Fuel Oil Emission Limits:**

nitrogen oxide (NO<sub>x</sub>) emissions shall not exceed 2.08 lbs/hr and 9.1 tons per year

carbon monoxide (CO) emissions shall not exceed

0.52 lb/hr, and 2.28 tons per year

particulate matter (PM) emissions shall not exceed 0.21 lb/hr and 0.92 tons per year

sulfur oxide (SO<sub>x</sub>) emissions shall not exceed 3.74 lbs/hr and 16.38 tons per year

Visible particulate emissions shall not exceed 20% opacity, as a 6-minute average, except as provided by rule.

**2. Additional Terms and Conditions****2.a** None**II. Operational Restrictions**

1. The permittee shall burn only natural gas or #2 fuel oil in this emissions unit.
2. Only fuel oil with a sulfur content of 0.25 percent or less may be used in this emissions unit.

**III. Monitoring and/or Recordkeeping Requirements**

1. For each day during which the permittee burns a fuel other than natural gas or #2 fuel oil the permittee shall maintain a record of the type and quantity of fuel burned in this emissions unit.
2. The permittee shall monitor the sulfur content of the fuel being fired in the emission unit. Fuel sampling and analysis shall be conducted according to the procedures and at the frequency specified by 40 CFR Part 75, Appendix D.

**IV. Reporting Requirements**

1. The permittee shall submit deviation (excursion) reports that identify each day when a fuel other than natural gas or #2 fuel oil was burned in this emissions unit. Each report shall be submitted within 30 days after the deviation occurs.
2. The permittee shall submit deviation (excursion) reports that identify any record which shows that the sulfur content of the fuel oil exceeded 0.25 percent . These reports are due by the date described in Part I - General Terms and Conditions of this permit under section (A)(2).
3. The permittee shall submit reports (hardcopy or electronic format) within 30 days following the end of each calendar quarter to the Ohio EPA, Southeast District Office documenting all instances of opacity values in excess of the limitations specified in OAC rule 3745-17-07, detailing the date, commencement and completion times, duration, magnitude (percent opacity), reason (if known), and corrective action(s) taken (if any) of each 6-minute block average above the applicable opacity limitation(s).

The reports shall also identify any excursions of the start-up and shutdown provisions specified in OAC rule 3745-17-07(A)(3).

If there are no excess emissions during the calendar quarter, the permittee shall submit a statement

to that effect along with the emissions unit operating time during the reporting period and the date, time, reason, and corrective action(s) taken for each time period of emissions unit, control equipment, and/or monitoring system malfunctions. The total operating time of the emissions unit and the total operating time of the analyzer while the emissions unit was on line also shall be included in the quarterly report.

These quarterly excess emission reports shall be submitted by January 30, April 30, July 30, and October 30 of each year and shall address the data obtained during the previous calendar quarter.

## V. Testing Requirements

### Natural Gas Emission Limitations:

1. Compliance with the emission limitation of 0.020 pound particulate matter per million Btu actual heat input, and 1.28 tons per year is demonstrated as follows:

Divide the applicable AP-42, 5th Edition (supplement D) emission factor for filterable particulate matter from table 1.4-2 (for units between 10 and 100 million Btu/hr) by the assumed heat content of natural gas (1020 Btu/cubic foot):

$(7.6 \text{ lbs particulate matter/million cubic feet}) \times (\text{cubic foot}/1020 \text{ Btu}) = 0.0075 \text{ lb particulate matter/million Btu.}$

The emission limitation of 1.28 tons per year of PM is demonstrated by the following calculation:

$0.020 \text{ lb/PM} (14.65 \text{ MMBtu/hr}) = 0.293 \text{ lb/hr} (8760 \text{ hr/yr}) = 1.28 \text{ tpy.}$

Emission tests also may be required in accordance with 40 CFR Part 60, Appendix A, Methods 1-5 and the procedures specified in OAC rule 3745-17-03. No emission testing is specifically required to demonstrate compliance with this limit but, if appropriate, may be requested pursuant to OAC rule 3745-15-04 (A).

2. Compliance with the visible emission limit shall be determined through visible emission observations performed in accordance with 40 CFR Part 60, Appendix A, Method 9 and the procedures specified in OAC rule 3745-17-03 (B)(1). No visible emission testing is specifically required to demonstrate compliance with this limit but, if appropriate, may be requested pursuant to OAC rule 3745-15-04 (A).
3. Compliance with the emission limitation of 0.75 pounds NO<sub>x</sub> per hour and 3.29 tons NO<sub>x</sub> per year is demonstrated as follows:

Divide the applicable AP-42, 5th Edition (supplement D) emission factor for NO<sub>x</sub> from table 1.4-1 (for units between 10 and 100 million Btu/hr) by the assumed heat content of natural gas (1020 Btu/cubic foot) and then multiply by the rated heat input capacity of 14.65 mmBtu/hr:

Emissions Unit ID: B007

$(50 \text{ lbs NOx/million cubic feet}) \times (\text{cubic foot}/1020 \text{ Btu}) \times (14.65 \text{ mmBtu/hr}) = 0.75 \text{ pound NOx/hr.}$

$(0.75 \text{ pound Nox/hr}) \times (8760 \text{ hrs/yr}) = 3.29 \text{ tons per year.}$

Emission tests also may be required in accordance with the procedures specified in OAC rule 3745-17-03. No emission testing is specifically required to demonstrate compliance with this limit but, if appropriate, may be requested pursuant to OAC rule 3745-15-04 (A).

4. Compliance with the emission limitation of 1.26 pounds CO per hour and 5.52 tons CO per year is demonstrated as follows:

Divide the applicable AP-42, 5th Edition (supplement D) emission factor for CO from table 1.4-1 (for units between 10 and 100 million Btu/hr) by the assumed heat content of natural gas (1020 Btu/cubic foot) and then multiply by the rated heat input capacity of 14.65 mmBtu/hr:

$(84 \text{ lbs CO/million cubic feet}) \times (\text{cubic foot}/1020 \text{ Btu}) \times (14.65 \text{ mmBtu/hr}) = 1.26 \text{ pounds CO/hr.}$

$(1.26 \text{ pounds CO/hr}) \times (8760 \text{ hrs/yr}) = 5.52 \text{ tons per year.}$

Emission tests also may be required in accordance with the procedures specified in OAC rule 3745-17-03. No emission testing is specifically required to demonstrate compliance with this limit but, if appropriate, may be requested pursuant to OAC rule 3745-15-04 (A).

## #2 Fuel Oil Limitations:

5. Compliance with the emission limitation of 3.74 pounds SOx per hour and 16.38 tons SOx per year is demonstrated as follows:

Multiply the applicable AP-42, 5th Edition (supplement E) emission factor for SOx from table 1.3-1 (for units less than 100 million Btu/hr) of  $((144 \text{ lbs}(.25)/1000 \text{ gallons})$  by the fuel usage rate (104 gal/hr) = 3.74 lbs/hr of SOx.

$(3.74 \text{ pounds SOx/hr}) \times (8760 \text{ hrs/yr}) = 16.38 \text{ tons per year.}$

6. Compliance with the emission limitation of 2.08 pounds NOx per hour and 9.1 tons NOx per year is demonstrated as follows:

Multiply the applicable AP-42, 5th Edition (supplement E) emission factor for NOx from table 1.3-1 (for units less than 100 million Btu/hr) of  $(20 \text{ lbs}/1000 \text{ gallons})$  by the fuel usage rate (104 gal/hr) = 3.74 lbs/hr of SOx.

$(2.08 \text{ pounds NOx/hr}) \times (8760 \text{ hrs/yr}) = 9.1 \text{ tons per year.}$

7. Compliance with the emission limitation of 0.52 pound CO per hour and 2.28 tons CO per year is demonstrated as follows:

Multiply the applicable AP-42, 5th Edition (supplement E) emission factor for CO from table 1.3-1 (for units less than 100 million Btu/hr) of (5 lbs/1000 gallons) by the fuel usage rate (104 gal/hr) = 0.52 lb/hr of CO.

$(0.52 \text{ pound CO/hr}) \times (8760 \text{ hrs/yr}) = 2.28 \text{ tons per year.}$

8. Compliance with the emission limitation of 0.21 pound PM per hour and 0.92 tons PM per year is demonstrated as follows:

Multiply the applicable AP-42, 5th Edition (supplement E) emission factor for PM from table 1.3-1 (for units less than 100 million Btu/hr) of (2 lbs/1000 gallons) by the fuel usage rate (104 gal/hr) = 0.21 lbs/hr of PM.

$(0.21 \text{ pound PM/hr}) \times (8760 \text{ hrs/yr}) = 0.92 \text{ tons per year.}$
