The above named entity is hereby granted a Permit to Install for the above described emissions unit(s) pursuant to Chapter 3745-31 of the Ohio Administrative Code. Issuance of this permit does not constitute expressed or implied approval or agreement that, if constructed or modified in accordance with the plans included in the application, the above described emissions unit(s) of environmental pollutants will operate in compliance with applicable State and Federal laws and regulations, and does not constitute expressed or implied assurance that if constructed or modified in accordance with those plans and specifications, the above described emissions unit(s) of pollutants will be granted the necessary permits to operate (air) or NPDES permits as applicable.

This permit is granted subject to the conditions attached hereto.

Part I - GENERAL TERMS AND CONDITIONS**A. State and Federally Enforceable Permit To Install General Terms and Conditions****1. Monitoring and Related Recordkeeping and Reporting Requirements**

- a. Except as may otherwise be provided in the terms and conditions for a specific emissions unit, the permittee shall maintain records that include the following, where applicable, for any required monitoring under this permit:
 - i. The date, place (as defined in the permit), and time of sampling or measurements.
 - ii. The date(s) analyses were performed.
 - iii. The company or entity that performed the analyses.
 - iv. The analytical techniques or methods used.
 - v. The results of such analyses.
 - vi. The operating conditions existing at the time of sampling or measurement.
- b. Each record of any monitoring data, testing data, and support information required pursuant to this permit shall be retained for a period of five years from the date the record was created. Support information shall include, but not be limited to, all calibration and maintenance records and all original strip-chart recordings for continuous monitoring instrumentation, and copies of all reports required by this permit. Such records may be maintained in computerized form.
- c. Except as may otherwise be provided in the terms and conditions for a specific emissions unit, the permittee shall submit required reports in the following manner:
 - i. Reports of any required monitoring and/or recordkeeping of federally enforceable information shall be submitted to the appropriate Ohio EPA District Office or local air agency.
 - ii. Quarterly written reports of (i) any deviations from federally enforceable emission limitations, operational restrictions, and control device operating parameter limitations, excluding deviations resulting from malfunctions reported in accordance with OAC rule 3745-15-06, that have been detected by the testing, monitoring and recordkeeping requirements specified in this permit, (ii) the probable cause of such deviations, and (iii) any corrective actions or preventive measures taken, shall be made to the appropriate Ohio EPA District Office or local air agency. The written reports shall be submitted quarterly, i.e., by January 31, April 30, July 31, and October 31 of each year and shall cover the previous

calendar quarters. See B.10 below if no deviations occurred during the quarter.

- iii. Written reports, which identify any deviations from the federally enforceable monitoring, recordkeeping, and reporting requirements contained in this permit shall be submitted to the appropriate Ohio EPA District Office or local air agency every six months, i.e., by January 31 and July 31 of each year for the previous six calendar months. If no deviations occurred during a six-month period, the permittee shall submit a semi-annual report, which states that no deviations occurred during that period.
- iv. Each written report shall be signed by a responsible official certifying that, based on information and belief formed after reasonable inquiry, the statements and information in the report are true, accurate, and complete.

2. Scheduled Maintenance/Malfunction Reporting

Any scheduled maintenance of air pollution control equipment shall be performed in accordance with paragraph (A) of OAC rule 3745-15-06. The malfunction, i.e., upset, of any emissions units or any associated air pollution control system(s) shall be reported to the appropriate Ohio EPA District Office or local air agency in accordance with paragraph (B) of OAC rule 3745-15-06. (The definition of an upset condition shall be the same as that used in OAC rule 3745-15-06(B)(1) for a malfunction.) The verbal and written reports shall be submitted pursuant to OAC rule 3745-15-06.

Except as provided in that rule, any scheduled maintenance or malfunction necessitating the shutdown or bypassing of any air pollution control system(s) shall be accompanied by the shutdown of the emission unit(s) that is (are) served by such control system(s).

3. Risk Management Plans

If the permittee is required to develop and register a risk management plan pursuant to section 112(r) of the Clean Air Act, as amended, 42 U.S.C. 7401 et seq. ("Act"), the permittee shall comply with the requirement to register such a plan.

4. Title IV Provisions

If the permittee is subject to the requirements of 40 CFR Part 72 concerning acid rain, the permittee shall ensure that any affected emissions unit complies with those requirements. Emissions exceeding any allowances that are lawfully held under Title IV of the Act, or any regulations adopted thereunder, are prohibited.

5. Severability Clause

A determination that any term or condition of this permit is invalid shall not invalidate the force or effect of any other term or condition thereof, except to the extent that any other term or condition depends in whole or in part for its operation or implementation upon the term or condition declared invalid.

6. General Requirements

- a. The permittee must comply with all terms and conditions of this permit. Any noncompliance with the federally enforceable terms and conditions of this permit constitutes a violation of the Act, and is grounds for enforcement action or for permit revocation, revocation and reissuance, or modification, or for denial of a permit renewal application.
- b. It shall not be a defense for the permittee in an enforcement action that it would have been necessary to halt or reduce the permitted activity in order to maintain compliance with the federally enforceable terms and conditions of this permit.
- c. This permit may be modified, reopened, revoked, or revoked and reissued, for cause. The filing of a request by the permittee for a permit modification, revocation and reissuance, or revocation, or of a notification of planned changes or anticipated noncompliance does not stay any term and condition of this permit.
- d. This permit does not convey any property rights of any sort, or any exclusive privilege.
- e. The permittee shall furnish to the Director of the Ohio EPA, or an authorized representative of the Director, upon receipt of a written request and within a reasonable time, any information that may be requested to determine whether cause exists for modifying, reopening or revoking this permit or to determine compliance with this permit. Upon request, the permittee shall also furnish to the Director or an authorized representative of the Director, copies of records required to be kept by this permit. For information claimed to be confidential in the submittal to the Director, if the Administrator of the U.S. EPA requests such information, the permittee may furnish such records directly to the Administrator along with a claim of confidentiality.

7. Fees

The permittee shall pay fees to the Director of the Ohio EPA in accordance with ORC section 3745.11 and OAC Chapter 3745-78. The permittee shall pay all applicable Permit To Install fees within 30 days after the issuance of this Permit To Install.

8. Federal and State Enforceability

Only those terms and conditions designated in this permit as federally enforceable, that are

required under the Act, or any of its applicable requirements, including relevant provisions designed to limit the potential to emit of a source, are enforceable by the Administrator of the U.S. EPA, the State, and citizens under the Act. All other terms and conditions of this permit shall not be federally enforceable and shall be enforceable under State law only.

9. Compliance Requirements

- a. Any document (including reports) required to be submitted and required by a federally applicable requirement in this permit shall include a certification by a responsible official that, based on information and belief formed after reasonable inquiry, the statements in the document are true, accurate, and complete.
- b. Upon presentation of credentials and other documents as may be required by law, the permittee shall allow the Director of the Ohio EPA or an authorized representative of the Director to:
 - i. At reasonable times, enter upon the permittee's premises where a source is located or the emissions-related activity is conducted, or where records must be kept under the conditions of this permit.
 - ii. Have access to and copy, at reasonable times, any records that must be kept under the conditions of this permit, subject to the protection from disclosure to the public of confidential information consistent with ORC section 3704.08.
 - iii. Inspect at reasonable times any facilities, equipment (including monitoring and air pollution control equipment), practices, or operations regulated or required under this permit.
 - iv. As authorized by the Act, sample or monitor at reasonable times substances or parameters for the purpose of assuring compliance with the permit and applicable requirements.
- c. The permittee shall submit progress reports to the appropriate Ohio EPA District Office or local air agency concerning any schedule of compliance for meeting an applicable requirement. Progress reports shall be submitted semiannually, or more frequently if specified in the applicable requirement or by the Director of the Ohio EPA. Progress reports shall contain the following:
 - i. Dates for achieving the activities, milestones, or compliance required in any schedule of compliance, and dates when such activities, milestones, or compliance were achieved.
 - ii. An explanation of why any dates in any schedule of compliance were not or will not be met, and any preventive or corrective measures adopted.

10. Permit To Operate Application

- a. If the permittee is required to apply for a Title V permit pursuant to OAC Chapter 3745-77, the permittee shall submit a complete Title V permit application or a complete Title V permit modification application within twelve (12) months after commencing operation of the emissions units covered by this permit. However, if the proposed new or modified source(s) would be prohibited by the terms and conditions of an existing Title V permit, a Title V permit modification must be obtained before the operation of such new or modified source(s) pursuant to OAC rule 3745-77-04(D) and OAC rule 3745-77-08(C)(3)(d).
- b. If the permittee is required to apply for permit(s) pursuant to OAC Chapter 3745-35, the source(s) identified in this Permit To Install is (are) permitted to operate for a period of up to one year from the date the source(s) commenced operation. Permission to operate is granted only if the facility complies with all requirements contained in this permit and all applicable air pollution laws, regulations, and policies. Pursuant to OAC Chapter 3745-35, the permittee shall submit a complete operating permit application within thirty (30) days after commencing operation of the source(s) covered by this permit.

11. Best Available Technology

As specified in OAC Rule 3745-31-05, all new sources must employ Best Available Technology (BAT). Compliance with the terms and conditions of this permit will fulfill this requirement.

B. State Only Enforceable Permit To Install General Terms and Conditions**1. Compliance Requirements**

The emissions unit(s) identified in this Permit to Install shall remain in full compliance with all applicable State laws and regulations and the terms and conditions of this permit.

2. Reporting Requirements Related to Monitoring and Recordkeeping Requirements

The permittee shall submit required reports in the following manner:

- a. Reports of any required monitoring and/or recordkeeping of state-only enforceable information shall be submitted to the appropriate Ohio EPA District Office or local air agency.
- b. Except as otherwise may be provided in the terms and conditions for a specific emissions unit, quarterly written reports of (a) any deviations (excursions) from state-only required emission limitations, operational restrictions, and control device operating parameter limitations that have been detected by the testing, monitoring, and recordkeeping requirements specified in this permit, (b) the probable cause of such deviations, and (c) any corrective actions or preventive measures which have been or will be taken, shall be submitted to the appropriate Ohio EPA District Office or local air agency. If no deviations occurred during a calendar quarter, the permittee shall submit a quarterly report, which states that no deviations occurred during that quarter. The reports shall be submitted quarterly, i.e., by January 31, April 30, July 31, and October 31 of each year and shall cover the previous calendar quarters. (These quarterly reports shall exclude deviations resulting from malfunctions reported in accordance with OAC rule 3745-15-06.)

3. Permit Transfers

Any transferee of this permit shall assume the responsibilities of the prior permit holder. The appropriate Ohio EPA District Office or local air agency must be notified in writing of any transfer of this permit.

4. Air Pollution Nuisance

The air contaminants emitted by the emissions units covered by this permit shall not cause a public nuisance, in violation of OAC rule 3745-15-07.

5. Termination of Permit To Install

This permit to install shall terminate within eighteen months of the effective date of the permit to install if the owner or operator has not undertaken a continuing program of installation or modification or has not entered into a binding contractual obligation to undertake and complete within a reasonable time a continuing program of installation or modification. This deadline may be extended by up to 12 months if application is made to the Director within a reasonable time before the termination date and the party shows good cause for any such extension.

6. Construction of New Sources(s)

The proposed emissions unit(s) shall be constructed in strict accordance with the plans and application submitted for this permit to the Director of the Ohio Environmental Protection Agency. There may be no deviation from the approved plans without the express, written approval of the Agency. Any deviations from the approved plans or the above conditions may lead to such sanctions and penalties as provided under Ohio law. Approval of these plans does not constitute an assurance that the proposed facilities will operate in compliance with all Ohio laws and regulations. Additional facilities shall be installed upon orders of the Ohio Environmental Protection Agency if the proposed sources cannot meet the requirements of this permit or cannot meet applicable standards.

If the construction of the proposed emissions unit(s) has already begun or has been completed prior to the date the Director of the Environmental Protection Agency approves the permit application and plans, the approval does not constitute expressed or implied assurance that the proposed facility has been constructed in accordance with the approved plans. The action of beginning and/or completing construction prior to obtaining the Director's approval constitutes a violation of OAC rule 3745-31-02. Furthermore, issuance of the Permit to Install does not constitute an assurance that the proposed source will operate in compliance with all Ohio laws and regulations. Approval of the plans in any case is not to be construed as an approval of the facility as constructed and/or completed. Moreover, issuance of the Permit to Install is not to be construed as a waiver of any rights that the Ohio Environmental Protection Agency (or other persons) may have against the applicant for starting construction prior to the effective date of the permit. Additional facilities shall be installed upon orders of the Ohio Environmental Protection Agency if the proposed facilities cannot meet the requirements of this permit or cannot meet applicable standards.

7. Public Disclosure

The facility is hereby notified that this permit, and all agency records concerning the operation of this permitted source, are subject to public disclosure in accordance with OAC rule 3745-49-03.

8. Applicability

This Permit to Install is applicable only to the emissions unit(s) identified in the Permit To Install. Separate application must be made to the Director for the installation or modification of any other

emissions unit(s).

9. Construction Compliance Certification

The applicant shall provide Ohio EPA with a written certification (see enclosed form) that the facility has been constructed in accordance with the Permit To Install application and the terms and conditions of the Permit to Install. The certification shall be provided to Ohio EPA upon completion of construction but prior to startup of the source.

10. Additional Reporting Requirements When There Are No Deviations of Federally Enforceable Emission Limitations, Operational Restrictions, or Control Device Operating Parameter Limitations (See Section A of This Permit)

If no deviations occurred during a calendar quarter, the permittee shall submit a quarterly report, which states that no deviations occurred during that quarter. The reports shall be submitted quarterly, i.e., by January 31, April 30, July 31, and October 31 of each year and shall cover the previous calendar quarters.

A. State and Federally Enforceable Section

I. Applicable Emissions Limitations and/or Control Requirements

The specific operations(s), property, and/or equipment which constitute this emissions unit are listed in the following table along with the applicable rules and/or requirements and with the applicable emissions limitations and/or control measures. Emissions from this unit shall not exceed the listed limitations, and the listed control measures shall be specified in narrative form following the table.

The requirements of this rule also include compliance with the requirements of OAC rules 3745-21-09(U)(2)(e)(ii), 3745-21-09(U)(1)(d), 3745-21-07(G)(2), 3745-17-07, and 3745-17-11.

Emissions of organic compounds from this emissions unit shall not exceed 102.6 pounds per hour.

Emissions of particulate matter shall not exceed 0.030 grain per dry standard cubic foot of exhaust gases or there shall be no visible particulate emissions from the exhaust stack, whichever is less stringent.

Annual emissions of PM shall not exceed 13.4 tons.

Annual emissions shall not exceed 35.15 tons based on a rolling 12-month average.

This emissions unit shall not employ more than 10 gallons of coating on metal parts in any given day.

If this emissions unit ever

employs more than 10 gallons of coating on metal parts in any given day, thereafter, the VOC content of all metal coatings employed shall not exceed 3.5 pounds VOC per gallon (excluding water and exempt solvents) as a daily, volume-weighted average, pursuant to OAC rule 3745-21-09 (U)(1)(d), and the 10 gallons per day limitation will no longer be applicable.

No photochemically reactive materials (as defined in OAC 3745-21-01(C)(5)) shall be used while coating nonmetal parts or for cleanup in this emissions unit.

The emission limitation specified by this rule is less stringent than the emission limitation established pursuant to OAC rule 3745-31-05(A)(3).

2. Additional Terms and Conditions

2.a None

II. Operational Restrictions

1. The maximum annual organic compound usage rate for emissions unit P031 shall not exceed 35.15 tons per year based upon a rolling, 12-month summation of the emission rates. For the purpose of this usage limitation, organic compound usage is equivalent to organic compound emissions. To ensure enforceability during the first 12 calendar months of operation following the startup of emissions unit P031, the permittee shall not exceed the usage levels specified in the following table:

After the first 12 calendar months of operation following the startup of emissions unit P031, compliance with the annual usage rate limitation shall be based upon a rolling, 12-month summation of the usage rates.

III. Monitoring and/or Recordkeeping Requirements

1. The permittee shall collect and record the following information each month for the coating line:
 - a. The company identification for each coating and substrate on which it is used, as well as each cleanup material employed.
 - b. Documentation on whether or not each coating and cleanup material is a photochemically reactive material.
 - c. The number of gallons of each coating and cleanup material employed.

- d. The organic compound content of each coating and cleanup material, in pounds per gallon.
- e. The total organic compound emission (usage) rate for all coatings and cleanup materials, in pounds, i.e., the summation of (c)x(d) for all coatings and cleanup materials employed.
- f. The total number of hours the emissions unit was in operation.
- g. The average hourly organic compound emission rate for all coatings and cleanup materials, i.e., (e)/(f), in pounds per hour (average).
- h. For the first 12 calendar months following the startup of emissions unit P031, the cumulative total organic compound emissions (usage) calculated by adding the current month's total organic compound emissions (usage) to the total organic compound emissions (usage) for each calendar month since the startup of emissions unit P031.
- i. Beginning after the first 12 calendar months following the startup of emissions unit P031, the rolling, 12-month summation of total organic compound emissions (usage) calculated by adding the current month's total organic compound emissions (usage) to the total organic compound emissions (usage) for the preceding eleven calendar months.

[Note: The coating information must be for the coatings as employed, including any thinning solvents added at the emissions unit.]

2. NOTE: The record keeping requirements contained in this part shall only apply if the emissions unit does not employ more than 10 gallons of coating on metal parts in any given day. If any record shows that this emissions unit employs more than 10 gallons of coating on metal parts in any given day, thereafter, the record keeping requirements contained in Section A.III.3 of this permit shall apply and the 10 gallons per day limitation and associated record keeping and reporting will no longer be applicable.

The permittee shall collect and record the following information each day for the coating line when metal parts are coated:

- a. The name and identification number of each metal coating employed.
- b. The volume, in gallons, of each metal coating employed.
- c. The total volume, in gallons, of all of the metal coatings employed.

3. NOTE: The record keeping requirements contained in this part shall only apply if the 10 gallons per day limitation has been exceeded.

The permittee shall collect and record the following information each day for the coating line when metal parts are coated:

- a. The name and identification number of each metal coating, as applied.
 - b. The VOC content (excluding water and exempt solvents) and the number of gallons (excluding water and exempt solvents) of each metal coating, as applied.
 - c. For coatings dried at less than 200 degrees F, the daily volume-weighted average VOC content, as applied, calculated in accordance with the equation specified in paragraph (B)(9) of OAC rule 3745-21-10 for CVOC,2.
 - d. For clear coat coatings, the daily volume-weighted average VOC content, as applied, calculated in accordance with the equation specified in paragraph (B)(9) of OAC rule 3745-21-10 for CVOC,2.
4. The permittee shall perform daily checks for any visible particulate emissions from the fabric filter exhaust. The presence or absence of any visible emissions shall be noted in an operations log. If any visible emissions are observed, corrective actions shall be taken to eliminate the visible emissions and these actions shall also be noted in the operations log.

IV. Reporting Requirements

1. The permittee shall submit deviation (excursion) reports of any monthly record which shows that the total organic compound emission or usage rate exceeded 106.2 pounds per hour or 35.15 tons in any 12-month period, and the actual organic compound emission or usage rate for each such hour or 12-month period. The notification shall include a copy of such record and shall be sent to the Southeast District Office within 45 days after the exceedance occurs.
2. For the first 12 calendar months of operation following the startup of emissions unit P031, the permittee shall submit deviation (excursion) reports that identify all exceedances of the maximum allowable cumulative usage levels.
3. The permittee shall submit deviation (excursion) reports of any record which shows that a photochemically reactive material was used on a nonmetal part. The notification shall include a copy of such record and shall be sent to the Southeast District Office within 45 days after the

exceedance occurs.

4. NOTE: The reporting requirements contained in this part shall only apply if the emissions unit does not employ more than 10 gallons of coating on metal parts in any given day. If any record shows that this emissions unit employs more than 10 gallons of coating on metal parts in any given day, thereafter, the reporting requirements contained in Section A.IV.5 of this permit shall apply and the 10 gallons per day limitation and associated record keeping and reporting will no longer be applicable.

The permittee shall notify the Southeast District Office in writing of any daily record showing that the coating line employs more than the applicable maximum daily coating usage limit. The notification shall include a copy of such record and shall be sent to the Southeast District Office within 45 days after the exceedance occurs.

5. NOTE: The reporting requirements contained in this part shall only apply if the 10 gallons per day limitation has been exceeded.

The permittee shall notify the Southeast District Office in writing of any daily record showing that the daily volume-weighted average VOC content exceeds the applicable limitation. The notification shall include a copy of such record and shall be sent to the Southeast District Office within 45 days after the exceedance occurs.

6. The permittee shall submit semiannual written reports which (a) identify all days during which any visible particulate emissions were observed from the stack serving this emissions unit and (b) describe any corrective actions taken to eliminate the visible particulate emissions. These reports shall be submitted to the Director (the appropriate Ohio EPA District Office or local air agency) by January 31 and July 31 of each year and shall cover the previous 6-month period.
7. The permittee shall submit annual reports which include the total annual OC emissions from this emissions unit. This report shall be submitted by January 31 of each year.

V. Testing Requirements

1. Compliance with the emission limitation(s) in Section A.I. of these terms and conditions shall be determined in accordance with the following method(s):

- a. Emission Limitation:
- 102.6 pounds of organic compounds per hour
- Applicable Compliance Method:
- This represents the maximum rated capacity of the coating equipment. Compliance shall be based upon the record keeping specified in Section A.III.1 of this permit.
- b. Emission Limitation and Usage Limitation:
- 35.15 tons of organic compounds per 12-month period
- Applicable Compliance Method:
- Compliance shall be based upon the record keeping specified in Section A.III.1 of this permit.
- c. Emission Limitation:
- 10 gallons of coatings on metallic parts per day
- Applicable Compliance Method:
- Compliance shall be based upon the record keeping specified in Section A.III.2 of this permit.
- d. Emission Limitation:
- 3.5 pounds VOC per gallon of coating
- Applicable Compliance Method:
- Compliance shall be based upon the record keeping specified in Section A.III.3 of this permit.
- e. Emission Limitation:
- No photochemically reactive materials shall be used on nonmetallic parts.
- Applicable Compliance Method:
- Compliance shall be based upon the record keeping specified in Section A.III.1 of this

permit.

f. Emission Limitation:

0.030 grain of particulate matter emissions per dry standard cubic foot of exhaust gases

Applicable Compliance Method:

Compliance with the particulate matter emission limit of 0.030 grain per dry standard cubic foot of exhaust gases shall be determined in accordance with 40 CFR 60, Appendix A, Methods 1-5 and OAC rule 3745-17-03. No testing is specifically required to demonstrate compliance with this limit but, if appropriate, may be requested pursuant to OAC rule 3745-15-04(A).

g. Emission Limitation:

13.4 tons of particulate matter emissions per year

Applicable Compliance Method:

Compliance with the annual particulate matter emission limit has been determined by multiplying the short term allowable of 0.030 gr/dscf by the maximum flow rate of 11880 cfm to the baghouse at 8760 hr/yr as shown in the equation below. This limit cannot be exceeded without consistent violation of the short term limit.

$$(0.030 \text{ gr/dscf})(11880 \text{ cf/min})(60 \text{ min/hr})(1 \text{ lb} / 7000 \text{ gr})(8760 \text{ hr/yr})(0.0005 \text{ ton/lb}) = 13.4 \text{ TPY}$$

h. Emission Limitation:

No visible emissions from the stack

Applicable Compliance Method:

Compliance with the visible emission limit shall be determined in accordance with OAC rule 3745-17-03.

2. Formulation data or USEPA Method 24 shall be used to determine the organic compound or VOC content of the coatings and cleanup materials.

III. Monitoring and/or Recordkeeping Requirements

1. The permit to install for this emissions unit was evaluated based on the actual materials (typically coatings and cleanup materials) and the design parameters of the emissions unit's exhaust system, as specified by the permittee in the permit to install application. The Ohio EPA's "Review of New Sources of Air Toxic Emissions" policy ("Air Toxic Policy") was applied for each pollutant emitted by this emissions unit using data from the permit to install application and the SCREEN 3.0 model (or other Ohio EPA approved model). The predicted 1-hour maximum ground-level concentration from the use of the SCREEN 3.0 model was compared to the Maximum Acceptable Ground-Level Concentration (MAGLC). The following summarizes the results of the modeling for the "worst case" pollutant(s):

Pollutant: Isobutyl acetate

TLV (mg/m³): 150 ppm = 712.64 mg/m³

Maximum Hourly Emission Rate (lbs/hr): 28.0

2. Physical changes to or changes in the method of operation of the emissions unit after its installation or modification could affect the parameters used to determine whether or not the "Air Toxic Policy" is satisfied. Consequently, prior to making a change that could impact such parameters, the permittee shall conduct an evaluation to determine that the "Air Toxic Policy" will still be satisfied. If, upon evaluation, the permittee determines that the "Air Toxic Policy" will not be satisfied, the permittee will not make the change. Changes that can affect the parameters used in applying the "Air Toxic Policy" include the following:
 - a. changes in the composition of the materials used (typically for coatings or cleanup materials), or the use of new materials, that would result in the emission of a compound with a lower Threshold Limit Value (TLV), as indicated in the most recent version of the handbook entitled "American Conference of Governmental Industrial Hygienists (ACGIH)," than the lowest TLV value previously modeled;
 - b. changes in the composition of the materials, or use of new materials, that would result in an increase in emissions of any pollutant with a listed TLV that was proposed in the application and modeled; and
 - c. physical changes to the emissions unit or its exhaust parameters (e.g., increased/ decreased exhaust flow, changes in stack height, changes in stack diameter, etc.).

If the permittee determines that the "Air Toxic Policy" will be satisfied for the above changes, the Ohio EPA will not consider the change(s) to be a "modification" under OAC rule 3745-31-01(VV)(1)(a)(ii), and a modification of the existing permit to install will not be required. If the change(s) is (are) defined as a modification under other provisions of the modification definition (other than (VV)(1)(a)(ii)), then the permittee shall obtain a final permit to install prior to the change.

3. The permittee shall collect, record, and retain the following information when it conducts evaluations to determine that the changed emissions unit will still satisfy the "Air Toxic Policy":
 - a. a description of the parameters changed (composition of materials, new pollutants emitted, change in stack/exhaust parameters, etc.);
 - b. documentation of its evaluation and determination that the changed emissions unit still satisfies the "Air Toxic Policy"; and
 - c. where computer modeling is performed, a copy of the resulting computer model runs that
